RADIO

OTTAWA, May 9.—(By The Canadian Press)—Proposals to establish a nationally owned system of broadcasting for Canada are expected to occupy Parliament at the present session, following the report of a special committee tabled in the House of Commons today.

In addition to the report of the special committee, the House was today advised by the Prime Minister that the United States Government had voiced unwillingness to make such readjustments in the allocation of wave-lengths as would facilitate the plans to reorganize Canadian broadcasting.

Communist Will Appeal

HALIFAX, N. S., May 9.—(By The Canadian Press)—Stenographic evidence taken at last Wednesday's hearing into deportation charges against Stefan Worebeck of Montreal, one of the nine alleged Communists now held here, was released today by a Halifax business man who let it be known he is financing the defense.

Wednesday's hearing before the immigration tribunal of three, headed by R. N. Munroe of Ottawa, resulted in issuance of a deportation order against Worebeck, and L. A. Ryan, Counsel, entered notice of appeal, later forwarding a brief to the Minister of Immigration.

The connection between Worebeck and information from Edmonton through which the services of a lawyer were secured for him here, has not been revealed. It was learned that a Joseph Tatco, said to be an Edmonton police court interpreter, had arrived in the city, believed to have travelled on the same train with J. Synby, one of the nine held at the immigration shed; but he could not be found today.

When Worebeck took the stand Wednesday, according to the transcript of the evidence released today, it was demonstrated that he had entered Canada legally, but had never taken out naturalization papers. He said he was a member of Todowynanu, the Workers Benevolent Association—of the Ukrainian Labor Farmers' Association, and of the Canadian Labor Defense League.
