The East St. Louis, Mo., Daily Journal contains the following: Walter J. Broderick, one of the longest-time and best-known residents of East St. Louis, died at the home of his daughters, Sunday afternoon aged 64 years. He had been ill for some time from a complication of diseases. Mr. Broderick was born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, in 1846. He came to East St. Louis in 1870 and connected himself with the commission business at National Stock Yards, at which he remained until a few years ago as one of the principal operators there. He was a member of the Live Stock Exchange, and officer of the same for many years and was one of the most prominent and useful members in many ways. In fact, for many years he was more depended on in that realm than any other member, and was considered one of the best-posted live stock dealers in the whole country. Three years after he first came here, he returned to the Island, and was married, bringing his wife back here. She died here a few years ago. He leaves five children. He was a well educated man, well read and versatile, and probably possessed as capable a mental equipment as any person in his sphere of life. He was genial, courteous and engaging in manner and association, and made friends of all with whom he came in contact. All who ever knew him will feel a deep sorrow for the passing of Walter J. Broderick. The deceased was a brother-in-law of Mrs. James E. McDonald of Cardigan.

HOW LINCOLN VALUED MEN.

Abraham Lincoln pleaded more than once with the southern men and with the northern men to come to some agreement whereby the United States government could purchase the negroes of the slaveholders, and he said repeatedly it would be a saving economically over against the tremendous loss of carrying on war. This country would not listen to his advice, and we plunged into a great war which cost us untold suffering and immense outlay of money, twice over the amount that would have purchased every slave in the United States and given his owner a large and sufficient sum for the carrying on of his estate. We are spending in this country today for the punishment of men who have become criminals through drink and selfishness of different kinds, ten times as much money as would prevent the same number of men from getting into the jails, because we have not learned the lesson of Christian economy, because we grudge the cost of saving life, because we have not learned or appreciated the value of men as compared with sheep.
