Large Crowd Witness Annual Ice Sports Of West Kent School Held At Forum Last Night

With one of the largest crowds in recent years in attendance the annual West Kent school ice sports were staged at the Forum last night with every event on the 20 listed producing keen competition and close finishes. In addition to the skating events the relay race between West Kent and Prince of Wales with West Kent being returned the winners and the hockey match between a class team of P. W. C. and the West Kent team, won by the former, highlighted the night's program which wound up with an hour's skating.

Outstanding skater in the boys events was Bill Porter with two first places and a third with girls honors were carried by smooth-skating Fairlie Prowse who chalked up three first places during the evening. All races were featured by blanket finishes with the competitors showing surprising bursts of speed; the younger skaters also, particularly from nine to twelve years, displayed ability on the steel blades.

A faster and heavier Prince of Wales team skated to a 3-0 victory over the West Kent team in a rousing hard-bumping encounter, the winners scoring a goal in the second period and then adding two in the final one; while keeping the school off the score sheet.

Starting at a fast clip both teams hit hard and often during the first period but could not dent the twines although both goals had to be good on several occasions to keep their net free of the lively-moving rubber.

Five minutes after the start of the second period with the hard bumping becoming more and more evident Prince of Wales scored their first goal, gathering the disc at his own line Hooper heady P. W. C. forward raced into the clear from a West Kent attack as he skated into scoring range passed to Auld the latter sliding the disc into the twines. For the rest of the period both teams attacked unceasingly but could not break through for another score due to the close checking being displayed by both sides.

Bruins Down Maple Leafs By 5-0 Score

BOSTON, Feb. 20.—(CP)—With their famous Saterkaut line performing in spectacular fashion, the Boston Bruins regained their top place National Hockey League tie with the New York Rangers tonight by overwhelming the Toronto Maple Leafs, 5-0 before a 13,286 crowd at the Boston Gardens.

Four of the Boston counters were supplied by the Kitchener Krauts, led by Woody Lumart and one each by Milt Schmidt and Little Bobby Bauer. Schmitt collected assists on each of his mates goals to wind up with a total of four points which boosted his league high total to 43 points. Three of their goals were bunched in the final period.

The game was as good as decided during the 11th minute of play when Herb Cain countered the Boston tally driving a long shot through goalie Turk Boda from an almost impossible angle.

Refreshed by a week's rest, the Bruins while building up their sixth consecutive win and Gene Frank Brumsek's fourth shutout of the campaign, held the speedy Maple Leafs under such a tight rein that they seldom got the puck beyond centre ice.

Brumsek had to make but 13 stops, only one of which was difficult and twice during the game he rested in his cage for 15 minutes without being interrupted by his rivals.

Before the opening faceoff, the "gallery gods" made their annual awards to the players they considered outstanding this season. The awards went to two former Marlborers, Bill Cowley, one-time Halifax Wulverine, and Flash Holmgren, native of North Sydney, N. S.

The two stars were presented with wrist watches, and portraits drawn by John Preston, one of the gallery gods.

Dutch Guilder Makes Gain On Exchange NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(CP)—The Netherlands guilder broke away from the main line of principal European currencies with a gain of nearly 1-20 cent in relation to the United States dollar in the foreign exchange market today.

Strength in the guilder, which advanced 04 cent, was associated by money dealers with shifting trade ties due to the war and the parts neutral nations were playing in European economic life.

Aside from a minor loss in the Swiss franc and the gain in the guilder, the money market was very quiet. The pound sterling at \$3.56-1-4, the French franc at 2.25-1-8 and the Canadian dollar at a discount of 13-1-2 per cent, were unchanged.

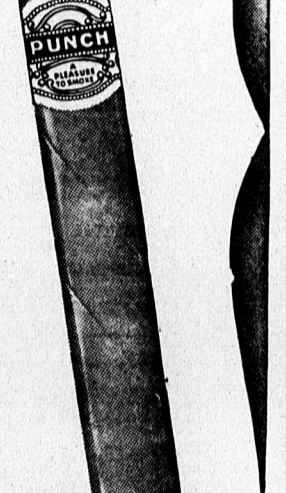
