THE PAGAN ANOTHER HIT FOR NOVARRO

Ramon Novarro, whose most recent appearance was in the uniform of civilization, is now to be seen at the Prince Edward Theatre in "The Pagan" playing in a vastly different and far more glamorous role.
The Metro-Goldwyn star reaps a triumph in "The Pagan," a vivid drama of the South Seas. "The Pagan Love Song" is one of the most hauntingly beautiful theme songs yet introduced in any picture, and is featured by the orchestra.
As a half-caste islander trying to hold to the traditions of his island against the influx of a foreign civilization, he stages a disparate, yet romantic struggle for the girl he loves. Novarro's role is reminiscent of that earlier success of his, "Where the Pavement Ends." In "The Pagan" however, he portrays a far different and far more strenuous character.
"The Pagan" was filmed in its entirety in the South Seas and is a vivid blend of thrills and romance. Novarro's love story his battle with the sharks under water and other jungle thrills, are splendidly balanced by the skillful direction of W. S. Van Dyke, who will be remembered as director of "White Shadows in the South Seas." The native scenery is particularly gorgeous.
Renee Adoree plays the role of "Madge," the white adventuress, who seeks the love of the young island hero, and Dorothy Janis is seen as the little island sweetheart for whom he struggles. Both Miss Adoree and the more recent film comer, Miss Janis, play with assured artistry. Donald Crisp portrays the overbearing sea trader; Novarro's nemesis in the story.
Quaint native customs, habits and life are shown in incidental detail to the gripping plot which was adapted from "John Fussell's noted novel of the tropics."

"Putty" Connors, husky and versatile hurling ace of the Abegweits, has again come through.
Letting Yarmouth, Nova Scotia champions, down with only four hits and one lone pass, this sneaky moundsman, hero of the Moncton-Island series, turned the invaders back to 4 to 2 in a game punctuated with plenty of thrills throughout. The Abegweits garnered twelve safeties off the delivery of Le Cain, while the best the Nova Scotians could do was to get four.
Once again the always unpopular errors played an important part in yesterday's set-to; with the visitors suffering the most, a wild throw by backstop White in the sixth allowed McEachern and Francis to romp home. The Abegweit errors were only minor. It was partly due to this fact that the locals came through with flying colors.
The entire team yesterday qualified for a place in "Murderers row," each and every man up getting one or more safe hit off Le Cain. They had to be almost one hundred percent ball players yesterday to take Yarmouth into camp. Their fielding both in the inner and outer defences, was marvelous and their batting was of championship calibre. This added to the superb and masterful mounding of Connors was easily too much for the "Bluesnose" champions.
For Yarmouth, Le Cain pitched good ball. He started out nicely till that costly error in the sixth, and after that he was somewhat unsteady behind the rather erratic fielding of the inner garden. However, the Yarmouth outfield played errorless ball, and on more than one occasion had the fans on the edges of their seats with sensational catches of long drives off the bats of Abbie batsmen.
Murray Veno, Yarmouth leader, was the big "Dick" on his lineup yesterday. His fielding was excellent, and at bat, counted for two of the four hits earned.
The attendance yesterday due to a cool north east wind with little sunshine, was not up to expectations, only eight hundred or less fans turning out. Today's game however, with a promise of bright warm sunshine, should turn out twice the number. It is only fitting that the entire city get behind the boys. If one doesn't know the game, attend anyway—it's never too late to learn—and then again the moral support is a great help. So let's see a bang-up attendance this afternoon.
