Net Debt

Perhaps the salient point of the whole report is the net debt in net debt. This amount is \$50,000,000 during the year under review. This brings our City's net debt to \$1,300,000,000, including bank overdrafts, and accounts payable, less sinking fund investments, cash in hand, and cash in bank to \$1,300,000,000.

Debiture Issues
