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Serious Trouble Is Feared In Iraq

DEATH TOLL MOUNTS STEADILY IN JAMAICA 300 Assyrian Christians Are Murdered By Army

DEATHS PLACED AT 130 IN STORM AREA

Property Damage Thought to Exceed Over \$2,000,000.

SUPPLY SHORTAGE

50,000 Inhabitants Suffer From Water Shortage And Other Supplies.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 17.—(A.P.)—The death toll from Wednesday morning's tropical storm and floods reached 130 persons today as a survey of the destruction was completed.

About 50,000 inhabitants were sufferers from a water shortage and lack of other supplies.

The plight of the sufferers was acute and it was estimated it would take \$500,000 to restore homes and provide for the needs of these persons.

Governor Sir Ransford Slater sponsored the raising of a relief fund.

Fiercest in Years

The storm was the fiercest Kingston had witnessed in 80 years, and property damage exceeds \$2,000,000. More than 100 houses were demolished yesterday by the fierce wind, and reconstruction work continued today on bridges and buildings.

The hardest hit section was through the parishes of St. Thomas, St. Catherine and St. Mary. Roads were wiped out as well as crops, and

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Cashier Robbed Of \$12,000

VANCOUVER, Aug. 17.—R. A. Pearce, cashier for Marshall-Wells, Limited, was attacked by a gang of bandits today and robbed of between \$11,000 and \$12,000 in cheques and \$70 in cash. Police arrested an unidentified man for investigation in connection with the holdup.

FIRE MENACES WOODED AREAS IN PRINCE CO.

Fire ravaging wooded areas in the vicinity of Miscouche, Prince County, about seven miles west of Summerside, caused anxiety yesterday as water is scarce and a high wind might cause the fire to veer in the direction of farm houses and fox ranches. The fire has travelled a distance of four miles in the past few days, destroying valuable wooded lots. Yesterday it reached Lot 16 woods, which are extensive and which adjoin some of the finest farm holdings in the Province. Members of the R.C.M.P. are assisting in fire-fighting efforts. The fire area includes a peat bog which may burn for several weeks unless quenched by heavy rain. The fire started at the Island Road on the north side of the Western Road at Miscouche corner. Other bush fires are reported in different sections of Western Prince County.

Three Killed In Havana

HAVANA, Aug. 17.—(A.P.)—Two men were killed in the vicinity of the capital and one at Camaguey today as a drive against supporters of former President Gerardo Machado was renewed.

Special objects of the drive are members of the Forra, a former secret strong arm police force, a number of whose members already have been slain. Authorities at Principe Prison said 40 men reputed to be Porristas are confined there in special cells.

Charges Against Machado Fyled

NASSAU, Aug. 17.—For the first time since murder charges were brought against him in Havana, Gerardo Machado, deposed and exiled President of Cuba, left his hotel this afternoon. He went to the radio-telephone office and talked with an unidentified person at an undisclosed point. The charges against Machado were fyled with a Havana court Monday.

GANDHI CARRIES ON FAST UNTO DEATH

POONA, India, Aug. 17.—The Mahatma Gandhi carried on his fast unto death tonight while Government officials continued efforts to get the prisoner to resume his frugal meals. It was reported as improbable the Bombay Government will extend privileges it already has offered to Gandhi but communications were still being sent between London and Simla.

FERGUSON ARRIVES ON VISIT

Canadian High Commissioner and Scott-Paine Among Arrivals At Quebec.

QUEBEC, Aug. 17.—(C.P.)—An impressive group of visitors and returning Canadians arrived here today aboard the liner Empress of Britain, the best known probably being Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom and Hubert Scott-Paine, English motorboat racer who hopes to lift the Harmsworth trophy from Gar Wood.

Some gang-plank statements to ship reporters:
Hon. G. Howard Ferguson: "The fact that the British Empire was the only group or unit to salvage anything from the World Economic Conference is an example of the feeling noticeable among representatives of all parts of the Empire to encourage closer trade and improved relations. When the rapid progress towards economic recovery made by the Mother Country is realized, one has sound reasons for optimism regarding the future of the Empire."

Hubert Scott-Paine: "The odds are four to one at least against me but that is half the fun of the thing. I shall send the Miss British (his boat) around the course at a comfortable speed of 100 miles an hour or so and while not expecting to break the world speed record I feel I have a good sporting chance of beating Wood."

Sir John Aird, Toronto, President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce: "The less we say about banking, the better. It would be unwise to say anything at the present moment with the Royal Commission on the operation of the Bank Act investigating banking in Canada."

Policeman Killed By Mob

CAMAGUEY, Cuba, Aug. 17.—Marcel Herrero, a policeman charged with crimes committed under the deposed Machado administration, was killed by a mob today after he had wounded a man with his pistol. Two other persons were slightly injured. The outburst occurred after Herrero had been arrested.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Queried on reports Canada may dump or subsidize wheat, Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada today said it was "highly improbable."

LONDON, Aug. 17.—The King today commanded Sir Phillip Cunliffe-Lister, Colonial Secretary, to cable to Governor Sir Ransford Slater of Jamaica His Majesty's deep regret on learning that a severe storm had caused loss of life and large property damage on the island. The cable expressed the King's profound sympathy.

Machado Has No Plans For Future

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 17.—Senator Machado, wife of the deposed President of Cuba, today denied reports the Machados had relatives in Canada and might go there. She said no plans for the future had been made.

RUSSIA HAS FAVORABLE TRADE BALANCE

Report Shows Favorable Balance For First Time Since 1929.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(A.P.)—Russia had a favorable balance of trade for the first time since 1929. Trade totals made available by the American-Russian Chamber of Commerce showed exports amounting to 224,572,000 rubles and imports of 190,914,000 rubles—a balance of 33,658,000 rubles (approximately \$17,500,000 Canadian funds). Germany was the heaviest trader with the U.S.S.R. during this period, buying approximately 48,000,000 rubles worth of products and selling to the Soviets more than twice that amount. A substantial portion of Russian purchases from Germany were of industrial equipment. Trade with the United Kingdom and France proved more advantageous to the Kremlin's balance sheet. To Great Britain, Russian exported goods worth 31,773,000 rubles while her imports totalled 18,257,000 rubles. In French trade, the figures are: imports 12,166,000; exports, 2,979,000.

Sam's Story Lacks Details

KENTVILLE, N. S., Aug. 17.—The Mounted Police doubted Sam Recco's hold-up story. They couldn't find any evidence to show Sam and a motorist—name unknown—had been robbed in the woods near here. Sam had called the police to tell them how two strangers held up him and his friend and relieved them of clothes and money. But when he got tangled up in the details, they promptly arrested Sam himself. He was sentenced to three days in jail for vagrancy.

Convict Fatally Wounded

SPRINGTOWN, Ark., Aug. 7.—Gene Johnson, alleged confederate of the Wilbur Underhill gang of escaped Kansas prison convicts, was wounded fatally and his wife, Jewell Johnson, was shot in the arm when a posse opened fire with machine guns and rifles at the Johnson farm home near here early today. A second alleged desperado and gunman, LeRoy Wright, although believed to have been wounded, escaped from the posse of 20 Arkansas, Oklahoma and Kansas officers. Wright was being sought with blood hounds in the Benton County wilds north of Siloam Springs.

Bennett's Holiday One Of Work - Work - Work

TORONTO, Aug. 17.—Prediction Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, "will bring home more bacon" when he returns to Canada shortly was voiced tonight by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, High Commissioner to Britain, when he returned to Toronto. "The holiday Mr. Bennett is taking over there at the present time is a work-work-holiday and I haven't a doubt but when he comes back here he will have more good news for the people of Canada," said Mr. Ferguson. "What I intend to do over here—and mind you, my visit isn't all holiday, is to study conditions as they now obtain in trade and things like that, so when I go back to England early in October I shall be able to transmit to the British authorities an intimate, close-up picture of the situation in this country," said Mr. Ferguson.

300 Assyrian Christians Are Murdered By Army

King Feisal Cancels Holiday—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald Returns To London To Consult Gov. Heads.

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Dispatches from Baghdad, Iraq, tonight said the recent troubles between Assyrian Christians and Iraq army forces had ended and King Feisal planned to leave tomorrow by aeroplane for Switzerland to continue his interrupted holiday. It was learned that British authorities here, however, take a serious view of the situation and the King may find it advisable to remain at Baghdad.

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Aug. 17.—(A.P.)—King Feisal tonight postponed his departure for Switzerland a week following urgent representations of the British Charge D'Affaires.

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DEATH OCCURS UNDER SAD CIRCUMSTANCES

The death of Mr. Joseph Duffy, 49, occurred Wednesday night under very sad circumstances. The body of the deceased who was a patient at Falconwood Hospital, and who had been improving in health, was found shortly before noon yesterday in the Hillsboro River near the wharf in front of Falconwood. Mr. Duffy who belonged in the vicinity of Kelly's Cross had been employed at light labor on the Falconwood Farm. About 10.30 p. m. according to a statement of his room mate, who raised the alarm, Mr. Duffy jumped out of the window of his bedroom. The attendants tracked him to the end of the wharf but there footprints ceased. The water was searched with flash lights, and when day dawned the search was continued. About 11.45 a. m. the body was found about 75 yards from the wharf. The R. C. M. I. and the Coroner, D. L. B. McKenna were called. The following jury were empanelled: Wm. P. MacLeod, foreman, T. A. Brothers, Claude Smith, Ivan Waters, Goreham Cook, Seymour Gregory, James Walker. The jury viewed the body, and the inquest was adjourned till 7 o'clock this evening.
