ISLAND BOXER ELIMINATED

Jimmy McInnis Loses Decision to Saint John Fighter at Loyalist City Last Night.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 7.—Ten bouts were completed after the Maritime amateur championships got underway here tonight, leaving eight more for the second half of the tournament tomorrow night.

A number of entrants who proved overweight for their scheduled bouts stepped up to the next class. Gerald Farnen, Saint John, flyweight champion, was the only entrant to qualify in the 112 pound division.

147 Pound Class—E. Harper, Amherst, and Boyd MacGillivray, Halifax. 160 Pound Class—Gus Vandenburg, Joggins, and J. MacDonald, New Waterford.

175 Pound Class—Ralph Rudderham, Sydney, and Ralph Goodline, Fredericton. In addition to Farren, all defending champions who were present survived tonight's bouts. They are Harry Burns, featherweight; Art Jardine, lightweight and J. MacDonald, middleweight. Gus Vandenburg, welterweight champion, was obliged to advance to 160 pound class and is paired with MacDonald for the final.

MCLARNIN EXPECTING TOUGH BATTLE FROM LIGHTWEIGHT CHAMP

Nel, Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, May 7.—Pink-checked Jimmy McLarnin, still looking like a choir boy though he's 29 now and contemplating matrimony, tempered more bad news for his Jewish fistie play-mates today with the first good news they've had in a long time to relieve their dispiritingly pessimistic mood.

The information that will ring pleasantly in many a cauliflower-eared plan to retire, though not for three years. The discouraging news is that the welterweight champion will have no trouble at all making 145 pounds for his 15-round title defence May 28 against Barney Ross of Chicago, brilliant little lightweight champion and the latest of the Jewish boys to defy the Irish-Canaan.

For half a dozen years now, McLarnin, who looks like a cherub and hits like a Dempsey, has been turning his right hand loose with stunning effect on the chins of Israelite heroes. The list reads through names such as Kid Kaplan, Joey Sanger, Sid Terris, Ray Miller, Al Singer, Ruby Goldstein, and finally encompassing the illustrious but aged Benny Leonard. It has amounted at times almost to a one-man race war.

McLarnin, just arrived from his Vancouver home to start his training Friday at Atlantic City, dissipated the ideas about his poundage by remarking: "I weigh under 147 right now. I'll be right on the dot at 145." He expects Ross, whom he has never seen, to give him a great deal of trouble, nevertheless.

No particulars on the fight have been received but it's a safe bet that the lone Island representative put up a game scrap and while not being outstanding will have gained much experience which will stand him in good stead for other meets.

William "Torchy" Peden and Jules Audy, Canadian exponents of the pne boards, as a team, added yet another victory to their string by taking the Toronto six day bike gring Saturday night before a capacity crowd at the Arena. This famous duo of pedal power finished in first place in Montreal a few weeks ago and plan to enter a Cincinnati race to "nowhere" in the near future.

William (Torchy) Peden, a great favorite of his countrymen, was born February 6th, 1906, in Vancouver, British Columbia. Torchy, as he is called because of his flaming red hair, although riding professionally for only four years, has completed in thirty continuous six-day races, having won fifteen out of an average of fifty per cent, a feat that no other rider in the world has ever accomplished, but then Torchy is in the habit of doing things that other riders cannot do.

Peden, it will be recalled, established a world record in 1928. He rode a bicycle paced by an automobile and under his own power for one mile at the speed of 78 1/2 miles an hour, on Highway No. 55, leading into Fort Snelling just outside of Minneapolis. Experts say that this record will stand for a long time, but Peden's main ambition in the bicycle game is to ride a bicycle for one mile at the speed of 100 miles an hour and wants to do this in Centennial Year.

In addition to winning six-day races in Montreal, Toronto, Vancouver, Portland, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Chicago and Detroit, he has won two of these grinds in Madison Square Garden, New York, which is the hotbed of cycling on this continent.

Canadian Champ Loses In Seventh

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HOLYOKE, Mass., May 7.—Sixto Escobar, little Porto Rican with a real punch, stopped Bobby Letham, bantamweight champion of Canada, in the seventh round of the Valley Arena 10-round boxing feature here tonight.

Smartly stabbing his Montreal foe throughout the sixth round until he caused Letham to lower his guard, Escobar unleashed a mighty overhead right just prior to the bell. The blow landed below Letham's left eye, cut a deep wound in the skin and at the same time raised a purple "mouse" which practically closed Bobby's optic.

The fighters came out spry for the seventh heat but fenced only a little more than a minute before the little Jack Dekker stopped the action to save Letham possible serious injury to his right eye. The winner weighed 120 to 117 1/2 for Letham.

The Yanks counted six times in the second inning and then coasted to victory behind Johnny Allen's fine pitching. Going the route for the first time this season, Allen scattered the Browns seven hits well scattered, struck out 11 and was not scored on until the ninth.

Senators Beat Chicago 17-1 The scorekeeper at Griffith Stadium mopped his brow wearily and marked up a 17-1 victory for Washington over Chicago White Sox.

Fifteen hits—nine of them off Lyons—and nine bases on balls contributed to the Senators' scoring orgy. Four White Sox pitchers tried vainly to stop the slaughter while Monte Weaver, going the route for Washington, was pounded for 12 hits that would have won most ball games.
