The plan of the Home Mission committee of the Presbyterian church to unify the mission work of the church received an unexpected check when the matter was introduced at the Edmonton Conference, the first recommendation of the committee was that the division of the church into two sections should be terminated and that in future administration this separation should not be recognized. As was stated by Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant, in his advocacy of the plan, there were not two churches but one and not two assemblies but one. The representatives of the maritime provinces who were present in the assembly made, however, a vigorous protest and no decision on the subject was reached. The proposal that all the work in the western section including the supervision of the hospitals, Sunday schools, Indian work, etc., should be under the supervision of the home mission committee, also received unexpected opposition. An overture has been sent from the Synod of Alberta suggesting that the work should be unified but that it should be decentralized and that Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia should be given complete supervision of the work in those provinces just as complete supervision of the work in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island was given to the synod of the maritime provinces. With opposition from this source Dr. A. S. Grant withdrew all the further recommendations of the Home Mission Committee of systematic conference which has charge of the new budget plan has reported.
