**THE ELECTRIC TRANSMISSION**

This transmission was I believe first adopted by the Haynes Co. Its object was to dispense with the lever type of gear change.

The steering wheel of the car contained the necessary apparatus for changing gears in the form of a small block into which were installed five buttons similar to electric bell push buttons. These buttons were marked in the following manner:—1, 2, 3, N, R. The first three figures indicating the gear change the N for neutral and R for reverse. The clutch operated with the gear change and the whole system as follows:—Upon depressing the clutch the circuit from the battery was opened and the gear drawn out of mesh by a spring just strong enough to release it. Upon the release of the clutch pedal the circuit was closed and an electric solenoid was saturated and the gear drawn into place.

Supposing the driver's intention was to take a drive in the ordinary manner, he would get into the car, depress the clutch and push No. 1 button. This would close the circuit of the solenoid or wire magnet. When he released his clutch half way back, the circuit would be closed through the clutch and the solenoid and the gear would slip into place or rather be drawn in by magnetic force. Then the pedal from that position back would operate directly in the clutch and the car would go along.

To move to different gears the same thing would happen, except that when he pushed the second or third gear button it would automatically release the magnetic drag from the button already pushed in.

To put his car into neutral, he would simply push the N button when the circuit would be open. This is explained in an elementary way to avoid complications.

The solenoid itself, will be explained in tomorrow's article as it is quite an interesting unit.

Ans.—In the first place the volt meter would be immediately burned out owing to the low resistance winding, this type being used for checking the voltage of one cell only of a battery.

Six volt meter across one cell of a battery would simply give you an approximate reading of the cell which is not to be relied upon but would not damage the instrument in any way.
