and as abundantly as Ontario or any other place in Canada. We import tons of peas, beans, and onions yearly, although we can grow them as well as they can be grown any where in the world.

Prince Edward Island is almost exclusively an agricultural country. All its business, commercial, industrial and professional, depends upon and is kept up by agriculture.

This is not mere newspaper vaporing. It has been proved. In the parish of Mount Carmel and the section of country bordering on Egmont Bay there are many farmers who, on small holdings, a few acres in fact, make more money in raising peas, beans, onions and similar truck than the average farmer makes in growing oats, potatoes, etc.

This one line, then, should be developed to its fullest possible limit. That limit will include the finishing of all our products before placing them upon the market.

Manufacturing industries are possible for Prince Edward Island, and not only possible but natural. They must be along agricultural lines, however, and they can include the items above named, and others. We export our raw hides and import our boots and shoes; we waste land in growing the cheaper grains and roots for export while we import, canned or prepared for our tables, many products which we could grow with immensely greater profit.

How does the matter stand with us today? Go into any one of our grocery stores and you will find the shelves and warehouses filled with canned meats, canned vegetables, canned and preserved fruits. All these we import from Ontario, although we can grow them as cheaply

as our own. This is one of the problems that Prince Edward Island must solve for itself in the near future if it is going to be true to itself and care for its own sons and daughters.
