Move Against Fleet Street Press Trust

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The defection of Lord Rothermere's and Lord Beaverbrook's newspapers was aroused the official Unionist party to its dangerous weakness as far as the metropolitan press is concerned. It is rumored that soon after the election a new Unionist afternoon newspaper will be started to replace the late lamented Pall Mall Gazette. It is also likely, your correspondent learns, that the Morning Post will change

hands. The Yorkshire Post will not be purchased as reported several days ago, but it will probably be sold by Lady Bathurst to a syndicate in which Colonel F. S. Jackson, chairman of the National Unionist Association, will have an important share. This will mean that the Post will change from being an Independent Unionist newspaper with strong opinions of its own—some of which, such as regards France, it has found difficult to harmonize with the views of the cabinet—to being the regular official organ of the Unionist party.

Allan, animal pathologist of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, has returned to the city from Moncton where he attended a meeting of the Maritime Veterinary Surgeons. The purpose of the meeting was to establish a Maritime Veterinary Organization principally with the view of appealing reciprocity between the veterinary of the Maritime Provinces. Gough, Halifax, N. S., represented the Nova Scotia Veterinary Association.

The above medal is awarded by the School Department of the Underwood Typewriter Company of New York, though their head office at Toronto. Candidates are required first to pass a rigid examination dealing with the construction and operating of the famous Underwood machine, and the are required to write for fifteen consecutive minutes from tests furnished by the Underwood School Department—a new matter not previously seen—at a net rate of from Forty to Fifty words per minute. Ten words are deducted for every typographical error or omission.

The Guardian joins in congratulations to Miss McLennan and the College, and understands that the former does not intend letting up, but has their silver and gold medal in view, and will probably write the test in Toronto next July.

IN MEMORIAM

COLONEL GEORGE CROCKETT

York today mourned the loss of another of its stalwarts in the person of Colonel George Crockett who passed away Wednesday at the age of seventy-four.

Colonel Crockett was a man of splendid physique and of great vitality and energy, but about a year ago he received injuries as the result of a fall and since then his health began to fail him, although his last illness was of comparatively brief duration.

He was a worthy descendant of the pioneers of York, and a son of the late Donald Crockett. He was a splendid type of a practical Prince Edward Island farmer. By hard work, thrift, sound judgment and intelligence he achieved a large measure of success. He was one of the most prominent breeders of hogs and poultry in the Maritime Provinces, and at various exhibitions carried off many prizes, particularly for Yorkshire hogs. In other branches of agriculture he also excelled.

Colonel Crockett was one of the leading residents of that locality. He always took an active part in everything tending to the advancement of the community in which he occupied an honored position, being frequently called upon to preside at many of the meetings held in that progressive agricultural section.

He was a prominent member and a steward of the Methodist Church was superintendent in the Sunday School for fifty years, and last Spring when he rounded out his jubilee the people fittingly observed the interesting anniversary.

Colonel Crockett became identified with the militia at an early age and by sheer merit rose to a high rank, and was one of the most popular and respected officers of the 82nd Regiment. He was one of the best rifle shots in the Province, being for many years a member of the York Rifle Club. He took part in
