In dealing with trusts the Montreal Witness remarks that an international trust to control the salt trade of the whole world differs from other trusts only in the fact that it is the first combination of the kind which seeks to bring all the earth into its grasp. The Standard Oil Company aimed at establishing a monopoly of this kind, but the sources of supply in Russia and elsewhere were beyond its reach, less on account of the financial magnitude of the attempt than on account of the jealousy of the governments in the countries concerned. The constant discoveries of new oil fields and the abundance of capital also made the endeavor to gobble everything too big a job even for the Rockefeller organization. Apparently an international salt trust is beset with less difficulties. By the Salt Union of Great Britain, the National Salt Company of the United States and the Canadian Salt Company of Canada the trust will secure monopoly in the most directly remunerative countries. As salt production is a monopoly in Germany, France and Spain, no great difficulty is anticipated in bringing those countries into the ring. Russia, the greatest salt producer of all appears to be omitted from the scheme at present, just as Russian petroleum is free from the Standard Oil Company. But China, Japan and the countries of Africa and Asia are included. In view of this scheme to control one of the ideas naturally occurs that if the salt of the earth can be covered by a trust, why not other necessities one after the other, till the economic slavery of mankind is established by a money power supreme in its financial strength over national governments and parliaments! It seems evident that the coming struggle will be between the people and the money interests for the control of legislatures.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

It is famed for its many pleasant drives the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera House. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief resorts of the citizens here. It has one of the largest and best equipped port-packing establishments in the Dominion. On the west side in the Park; on the east side are the magnificent new Exhibition Building and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares are Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, a fountain and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has above 8000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedouque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ, Strathcona and Campbell. Georgetown and Souris have a population

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View at Stanhope, Mutehe's, and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Seaside; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaford; and at Pownal, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodations, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams team with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.

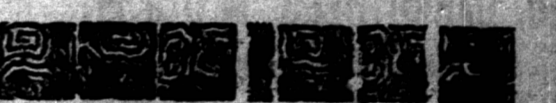

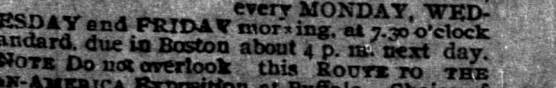
