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#### Government Alarmed

Alarmed at the critical turn which the strike has taken the Government took a hand in the situation. Premier Julius Gombos sent five trade-unionists down to the pit with an ultimatum to the men: "Come up within 30 minutes. If you refrain from lawlessness and violence we will negotiate with you."

Stevens Commission To Probe Maritime Fishery Problems, Starting Oct. 27

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 14.—Outstanding events of the week in government circles were reduction of the interest rates on savings accounts from 2 1/2 to two percent, oversubscription by some \$33,000,000 of the 1934 refunding loan of \$250,000,000 which has a maximum yield of 3.81 percent, and the announcement yesterday that revenues for the first six months of the fiscal year were \$20,000,000 greater than for the same period last year, all of which combined to give an encouraging picture of Canadian economic conditions.
