With the Atlantic

LONDON, March 28 - There is less naval construction going on in Britain than at any time since when in 1890 Germany threw down her reckless challenge to Britannia for the trident of the seas. Not a single capital ship is on the stocks - not a battleship for an armored cruiser. All private yards, which for many years have been fostered by the Admiralty in order that all the ship-building resources of the nation might be mobilized in time of need - as indeed was done in the Great War - are now engaged solely on mercantile construction with but a single exception. Great as may have been post-war extravagance in other directions, the Admiralty certainly has exercised absolute economy in new construction.

struction programmes. But there are two reasons. Chief is that no money is available, and that the new fleet created by the war is capable for some years at least of taking care of the naval defense of the British Empire; but hardly less important is that the expert advisors of the Admiralty are not yet decided as to whether the great surface capital ship in view of air and underwater perils, has a practical future.

The arrival at Portsmouth from the works of Messrs. Thornycroft of the flotilla leader Rooke leaves outstanding in the private yards only one surface vessel of war out of the large number which was under construction at the Armistice. After as many contracts as possible had been cancelled and certain of the vessels had been completed, still remained in hand at the time the navy estimates were issued last March, seven light cruisers, two flotilla leaders, two aircraft carriers, and eight destroyers. With the exception of one destroyer, the "Whitehall," all these vessels have either been completed for service or have been removed to the public dock yards so as to set free the private yards for merchant construction.

In view of the forthcoming navy estimates, it may be mentioned that when the Whitehall is transferred to a government yard for completion there will be a total of eighteen vessels, apart from submarines and auxiliaries, in various stages of construction or fitting out. Devonport has six of them, the cruisers Raleigh, Frobisher, Enterprise and Durban the aircraft carrier Hermes, and the destroyer Witch. The Raleigh has already reached the trial stage, and
