**Dorothy Dix Says—
WOMAN ALONE MUST SOLVE
HER PROBLEM OF HAPPINESS
Man Treats Her As An Enigma Because She
Cannot Make Up Her Mind**

A famous psychologist says that if women ever make up their minds how they want to be treated they will have no difficulty in getting men to treat them that way. Maybe so, but before that miracle happens, they will have to acquire a lot more mental agility than they possess at the present writing, because every woman wants to be treated in half a dozen different ways, and by the time the poor man has made good on one count he finds that she has fallen down on the others. Nothing short of a human chameleon, who could change its color at a moment's notice, to match a woman's mood, could ever come up to her ideal of what she desired in a man. Women, to begin with, want men to treat them as their superiors, but also as their equals. They want men to put them on pedestals and look up to them and worship them as being only a little less holy than the angels. They want men to believe that they are more than they are; that they have purer thoughts and nobler aspirations, and live altogether on a higher plane. But they howl to high Heaven when men accept their own picture of them and try to keep them in their own sacred spheres. They want to be treated as equals and to be permitted to go to men's schools, follow men's professions, do men's work, wear men's clothes, smoke and drink like men, and they have fought to get these rights until there is hardly a college or a bar or a business house that isn't jam-packed with women.

WHY WIVES ARE DISSATISFIED
And yet they are not happy because they still want men to pick up their handkerchiefs for them and take off their hats to them in elevators; excuse sloppy work because of their sex, pay the check when they go out together, and generally handle them with gloves. Women are always complaining about the lack of chivalry in the modern man, but the reason is because a man doesn't feel very worshipful toward the woman who has taken away his job. Undoubtedly the reason that there are so many dissatisfied wives is not because their husbands do not treat them well, but because husbands do not treat them the way the wives want to be treated. The reason that this is the case is because wives have not made up their minds whether they wanted to be treated as Lady Loves, or business partners, or babies, or gigoles, or the head of the firm, but when he is called upon to combine all three roles it is no marvel that he so often fails to give satisfaction.

WANT PERPETUAL COURTSHIP
Every wife wants her husband to keep up the tactics of courtship even to their golden wedding anniversary. In her mind she remains a perpetual bride and wants him to never weary of telling her how beautiful and wonderful she is, but at the same time she demands that he be a go-getter who can bring home the bacon, although few men combine the talents of Henry Ford and Clark Gable and are ambidexterous enough to hold their wives' hands with one hand and make a fortune with the other.

There is nothing that wives are so generally bitter about as they are about their husbands' absorption in business, and they are just as jealous of their husbands' "old offices" as they would be over their maintaining love nests, but you never hear of a wife offering to give up her fine house and cars and other luxuries in order to enjoy more of John Henry's secretary.

Most wives want their husband to treat them as if they were adult human beings who had good brains, as well as good figures, and were capable of managing their own affairs. They want their husbands to treat them with handling money and to ask their advice and to chum with them.

THEN THEY LEAVE HOME
But also, they want to be treated like spoiled children, and when their husbands refuse to do this they pack their trunks and go back to Mother. The "brutality" which sends so many wives to the divorce courts and on which they collect money, consists in nothing more than their husbands insisting upon them keeping a budget and living within their means, or in the inhuman cruelty of expecting them to spend as much time in their kitchens as they do at their bridge games, and learning how to make coffee that is fit for human consumption. They want their husbands to chuck them under the chin and pet them as if they were three-year-olds. They want their husbands to give them new cars because they cry for them, and to dress them up in pretty clothes, and to call them "darling" and let them do as they please. And when they have husbands who treat them this way they brag about them to the sisterhood, and when they don't they weep upon each other's breasts.

So, taking all these things into consideration, it is no wonder that men don't treat women the way they want to be treated. It can't be done.

THE COOK'S CORNER

CANADIAN CHOP SUEY

2 tablespoons fat
2 sliced onions
1 chopped green pepper
2 cups raw pork cut in small strips
1-2 cup sliced mushrooms
1 cup chopped celery
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soy sauce
3 cups stock or bouillon
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Method: Melt the fat in a pan brown the sliced onion and the pork in this. Then add the chopped green pepper, sliced mushrooms and chopped celery. Now add the rice, salt stock or bouillon and the Worcestershire sauce and cook slowly until the rice is tender. Stir the mixture frequently to prevent sticking.

When thoroughly cooked, thicken the sauce with a little flour which has been moistened to a smooth paste with some cold water. Serve this very hot, on a bed of boiled or steamed rice, if desired.

If you are wondering about the lack of soy sauce in this—Worcestershire sauce, is made with a base of soy sauce.

FRUIT PUDDING SAUCES

One and one-half tablespoons cornstarch, 2 to 3 tablespoons granulated sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1-8 cups hot canned fruit and juice, 3 tablespoons corn syrup, 1 tablespoon butter, flavoring.

Combine cornstarch thoroughly with sugar and salt. Slowly stir in hot fruit and juice. Add corn syrup and stir and cook until the mixture has thickened smoothly and no raw flavor remains. Add butter, and flavor with a few drops of lemon juice or suitable extract.


Pineapple Sauce: Use canned crushed pineapple and juice as fruit and liquid; flavor with 1 teaspoon lemon juice.

Raspberry or Strawberry Sauce: Use canned raspberries or strawberries and their juice as fruit and liquid; flavor with 1 teaspoon lemon juice.

Cherry Sauce: Use canned cherries and their juice as fruit and liquid. Flavor with 6 drops almond extract. Or use 1 cup boiling water to replace liquid and fruit, and add chopped maraschino cherries.

Lemon Sauce: Use 1 cup boiling water to replace fruit and liquid. Flavor with 1-2 tablespoons lemon juice and 1-2 teaspoon grated lemon rind. Sugar may be increased.

GARDEN FOR VICTORY
Grow Vitamins at Your Kitchen Door



WINDOW BOXES OFFER ALL CHANCE TO JOIN CAMPAIGN

Whether he lives in a suburban home with a landscaped lot or in a tall apartment building, every one can make a window box garden. For some, this offers the only chance to take part in the Victory Garden campaign. Boxes can be constructed during the winter weeks so they will be ready for the earliest start in the spring.

For an ordinary single window, a box 3 1/2 feet long, 8 inches deep, and 10 inches wide is a good size. If made of cypress, it will last well, and cost less than a dollar. Where large or multiple windows demand great length, the other dimensions may be larger in proportion, or boxes for each window made.

Remember that window boxes are a decoration for the house. They should harmonize with it, and improve its appearance. Boxes should usually be painted to match the dominant color of the house, or of its trim. The flowers will look best if they make a contrasting note, providing an accent of color.

Perhaps the finest of all window box flowers are petunias, because they blossom constantly throughout the summer, and provide so interesting a variety of color, form and habit. The bicolor type petunias, which produce trailing vine-like stems, make graceful festoons which drape from the boxes.

Tall nasturtiums, particularly the new doubles, including Golden Gleam, and its hybrids, give the same effect as the bicolor type petunias, and they are excellent window box subjects. Fragrant flowers, such as matricaria bicoloris, nigmette, ten-weeks stocks, and dwarf snapdragons are doubly attractive.

Boxes which spend most of the day in shade offer a special problem. If the shades is that of a building, perhaps only foliage plants can be grown, such as ferns, fancy leaved caladiums, crotons, rubber plants and other florists' subjects. If there is some sun, tuberous rooted begonias will probably do well, impatiens, the Zanzibar balsam, bearing flowers of salmon or rose on bushy plants 18 inches tall, are excellent in semi-shaded places. Vicias thrive in partial shade, and the list of flowers which will do well increases as the amount of sun is enlarged.

Rich soil, of the type which florists call potting soil, should be used in window boxes, for there is so little of it to feed the flowers. Next to abundant plant food, apply at rate of one level tablespoonful for one square foot of soil.
