J. J. HILL CAPTURES CROW'S NEST

TORONTO, March 13—James J. Hill, of the Great Northern railway, has captured the Crow's Nest Coal company with its mines at Fernie, Michel and Morrison, B. C. An announcement which was made at the annual meeting of the company in Toronto today created quite a sensation in financial circles, and there is much speculation as to what the outcome will be. It is said, and on good authority, that Hill secured control through the purchase of a large block of stock from Sir Henry Pel-

At today's meeting G. G. S. Lindsay, president of the company, Senator Jaffray, vice-president, Sir Henry Pellat, and E. K. Wood, directors, who urged to remain on the board refused to do so. The board will probably consist of E. Rogers at Toronto, Colonel Clough, New York; J. P. Graves, Spokane; W. F. Robertson, Grandby, Quebec; C. G. Whitney and Hal McGivern, Ottawa, with R. N. Young, Toronto, as secretary. This board represents the interests of the Northern Securities company and Grandby Smelter, both under the control of Mr. Hill. The capital of the Crow's Nest company is \$6,200,000. The company last year mined 980,000 tons of coal and produced 262,000 tons of coke. If the new American tariff grants reciprocity on coal, Mr. Hill, with his own railway as a carrier, will be able to flood the American market with Canadian coal.

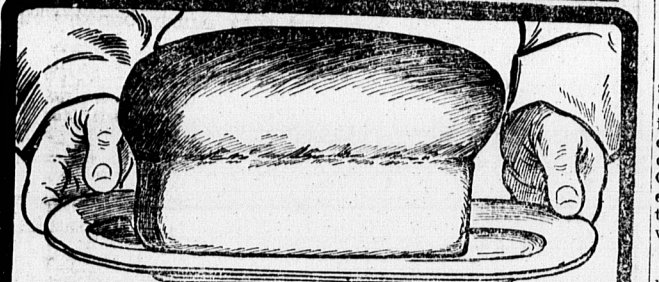
