DRESSED POULTRY

From January 1 to May 31, 1946, Canada has exported by agreement 1,697 boxes of chickens and 22 boxes of fowl to the British West Indies; 369 boxes of chickens and 5 boxes of turkeys to Newfoundland, and seven boxes of chickens to the islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon.

On the other hand, Canada has imported from the United States, 5,440 boxes of chickens, 419 boxes of turkeys, and 173 boxes of ducks. It is expected the imports of poultry will soon cease, say the Current Review of Agricultural Conditions in Canada, and that Canada will be in a position to export poultry within the next few months.

Blackberry Syrup Here is a recipe for blackberry syrup which may be kept ready to serve.

2 quarts berries 2 cups sugar 2 inches stick cinnamon 1 pound syrup 1 teaspoon cloves 1 teaspoon allspice

Wash the berries well, put them in a preserving pan and heat slowly, stirring often, until the boiling point is reached. Do not add water. Strain through cheese cloth. Add sugar and spices which have been tied in a small cheese cloth bag. Boil for thirty minutes. Add one pint boiling water. Fill sterilized bottles to overflowing may be omitted if they are not used immediately. The spices desired.

CHICK MARKET AGE The age at which chickens are marketed has a direct bearing on the quality of the carcass and on the amount of feed required to produce a pound of meat. Leonard Griesbach, Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, N. B., points out: Chickens will not fatten when they are growing rapidly, so they should be practically full grown when moved to the fattening pens. Usually this would be about six months of age for the heavy breeds, but it is not profitable to keep them long after they are full grown because the amount of feed required to produce a pound of gain increases with age and the quality of the carcass is highest shortly after maturity.

FARMERS' SONS DELEGATES

In the Australian News, issued by the Australian High Commissioner in Ottawa, mention is made of the training of farm boys and girls. In order to encourage farmers' children to take more interest in farming generally, and in the Primary Producers Union as farworth, New South Wales in particular, the district council has ruled that when a farmer father cannot attend a council meeting, his son will be able to act as his delegate. A special school has been inaugurated to train young farmers in subjects useful to organizational affairs. Sons and daughters may join the Primary Producers Union as associates without fee, or as junior members for a fee of one dollar. Junior members hold the same status as ordinary members.
