Live Stock Report

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—Live Stock.—There were 87 cattle, 253 sheep and lambs, 108 hogs and 239 calves for sale on the two markets this morning. The cattle were practically all bulls and common cows. Bulls weighing around 900 and 1000 pounds brought 3.00 and heavier kinds 3.25. Sheep and lambs remained about level with yesterday's sales, good lambs 12.75 to 13.00 and good sheep up to 6.50. Calves were firm. Good suckers 9.00 and an odd lot up to 9.50, and 10.00. Pairs of calves from 6.00 to 8.00 and good field calves up to 5.00. Straight grassers from 4.00 to 4.50. Thick smooths and good weight shop hogs brought 13.00. Hogs sold for 12.50 to 12.75 and lighter hogs were very difficult to sell. Sows were sold on a basis of 8.00 to good average quality, some bringing up to 9.50 and an odd rough sow as low as 8.00.
