IN MEMORIAM

JAMES FRANKLIN MACMILLAN

The sudden and unexpected death of James Franklin MacMillan, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund R. MacMillan, of West Covehead, on February 20, 1932, has been a very hard trial to his parents and sisters, and indeed few deaths have caused so much general sorrow and sympathy as the sudden call of this fine young man in his twenty second year. He had been ailing since the fall and had lately developed pleurisy, but seemed to be doing as well as anyone could under the circumstances. In the early morning of the day of his death, however, his heart suddenly weakened, and in spite of the doctor's efforts, failed completely, shortly after sunset, when God called his spirit home. Frankie was a general favorite, being of an unusually amiable and friendly disposition. Probably few sons are as good-natured and willing in their own homes as he was, all of which makes his loss the harder to bear. He was indeed one of those happy truthful childlike souls of whom the master said, "of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." Normally healthy and strong and very seldom ill, his seemingly untimely death is one of those mysteries of Divine Providence that are quite beyond our understanding here. Besides his sorrowing parents, three sisters, Bessie, Jean and Florence are left to mourn the loss of their only brother.

A very large number of kindred, friends and neighbors came to his funeral service in St. James United Church, West Covehead, so many indeed, that the large church was entirely filled. The service was conducted by his minister, Rev. Thomas A. Wilson, who spoke from the text Matthew 10:30. "The very hairs of your head are all numbered." The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery nearby, the pallbearers being his boyhood friends, Messrs. Roland Bearisto, Lorne MacMillan, James Allen, Horace Marshall, Roy Bell and Arthur Brown.

MRS. WILLIAM A. WALKER

The unexpected death of Mrs. William A. Walker on March first cast a gloom over the entire community. Although she had suffered a stroke in November, at which time she was critically ill for some weeks, it was generally understood that she was well on her way to complete recovery. Only a few hours illness preceded her death.

The funeral, which in spite of the bitter weather and bad road conditions, was very largely attended, took place on Thursday, March third, from Sacred Heart Church, Oyen, Alberta, where a Requiem High Mass was sung by Father Lynett, burial taking place in Oyen Cemetery.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Mary Ellen Dalton, was born at Fort Augustus, P. E. I., June 12th, 1892. In May 1916, she married William A. Walker, of Mount Ryan. They came west in 1921 and took up farming ten miles south of Oyen, where they have since resided. The late Mrs. Walker was at all times an active and faithful member of the Sacred Heart Parish, being President of the local sub-division of Catholic Women's League during 1930. Her good will and hospitality will be keenly missed in the community in which she dwelt.

Besides her husband and one daughter Rita, she leaves to mourn four sisters and one brother, Sister Catherine Rita, of Minneapolis, Mrs. J. M. Montgomery, Delburne, Alta., Mrs. R. A. Noonan and Anna of New York, and Thomas, her father and step-mother of Fort Augustus, P. E. I.
