RECEIVED GREETINGS — Mayor Lidstone, of Summerside, has received the following letter by air mail from His Worship the Mayor of London, Ont.: "The City of London sends greetings to you by the first air mail from London to Toronto and to Windsor. The air mail brings municipalities closer together, more and more the interests of one city become matters of interest to all others. The citizenship of individuals makes the quality of government in the Municipality, Province and Federal State. The improvement of government to meet modern conditions is our business. We offer you our best co-operation for the advancement of municipal government in our great country — Canada. W. J. Kilpatrick" Mayor Lidstone has made a suitable reply in which he expressed the hope that the London air mail would connect with Summerside in the near future.

FINISHED MARITIME TOUR — Dr. Griesback, of the Deutsches Outlandsche Institute, Stuttgart, Germany, has just completed a tour of the Maritime Provinces in company with F. C. Biette, Maritime Superintendent, Colonization Department of the Canadian National Railways. The association with which Dr. Griesback is connected has as its object the keeping in touch with emigrants who leave Germany for other lands. While in Nova Scotia, the Department of Natural Resources, Col. Innis, conducted Dr. Griesback to the various places in the province that would appeal to German immigrants. On Prince Edward Island the Department of Agriculture of that province assisted in placing the advantages of Prince Edward Island before Dr. Griesback, and in New Brunswick the Department of Immigration, Hon. J. A. Murray, likewise co-operated. When on Prince Edward Island Dr. Griesback visited a German settler who has been in the province for two years, and who declared himself favorably impressed with the country.—Moncton Times.

"CHAMPLAIN" IN PORT—H. M. C. S. "Champlain" arrived in port yesterday morning at 10 o'clock and docked at the east side of the Marine Wharf. At 11 o'clock Lt.-Commander John C. I. Edwards and staff called on His Honour Lieut. Governor Hearts, who later returned the call accompanied by his naval aide, Lieut. George Buntain and Secretary Sydney Fielding. Yesterday afternoon a number of the officers of the "Champlain" enjoyed a game of tennis on the Charlottetown Tennis Courts. It might be mentioned here that Commander Edwards is a racket wielder of no mean repute, having held the Canadian amateur title at one time. It is anticipated that a team from the ship will play a number of sets with some of our leading tennis players on Saturday. The "Champlain" leaves here on Wednesday morning, July 31st. His Honour regrets very much the departure of the ship on that date as he looked forward to entertaining the officers at New Annan Races.

LITTLE RAVEN PACES FASTEST HEAT IN 2.08

ROVERS 13 ALL-STARS 10

Colorful Novel Converted Into Vivid Picture ZANE GREY'S FAMOUS STORY VIVIDLY PORTRAYED AT CAPITOL

FREDERICTON, July 25. — The Maine and New Brunswick circuit campaigners staged one of the greatest racing programs ever seen in the east yesterday afternoon to inaugurate Fredericton's mid-summer meeting and with two Shriners' bands from Bangor and a lot of Shriners included among the good opening day crowd, it was a colorful affair. All three races on the card were split up, two of them requiring extra heats, and there was scarcely a heat in the 11 races that did not provide an exciting finish. One upset followed another as the unexpected happened in all three races from the opening when Little Raven, owned by J.H. Farnum, of Boston, won the first heat of the 2.15 pace in 2.08, the fastest time raced on the circuit this season. The biggest upset was in the 2.22 pace in which Donna Volo's Peter, a Peter Volo pacer in the stable of T. B. Wheeler, of Augusta, Me., landed on top by taking the third and fourth heats in 2:11 and 2:10 1-2, after Sadie Dillon and Martha Dewey, a couple of Massachusetts entries, had taken the first two rounds. Donna Volo's Peter was not considered a factor, sold in the overnight pools and rewarded the "short end" buyers at odds of 10 to 1 and better. Peter Patch, who has won in all kinds of company this season for the T. J. Kelley stable of Bangor, Me., was the only favorite or near favorite to land today. He won the third and fourth heats of the 2.15 pace after Little Raven and Early Todd had taken the first two rounds. A third heat in 2:08 1-4 and the last quarter of a slow fourth heat in 30 seconds was what he needed to beat Hedge-wood K. The Woodstock pacer, which was jointly favorite, and Early Todd, the Houlton pacer, which had won the second heat, respectively. Peter Patch seems to have just about as much brush as any horse on the circuit and a little more than most of them. Peter Patch sold for \$10 and so did Hedgewood K. in pools which totalled \$30, but the field players cashed in \$2 tickets at \$9.80 when Little Raven won the first heat, and the dividend on Early Todd's win in the second was almost as large. "Stairs of Sand" is based on the colorful Zane Grey novel of life in an Arizona town and it loses none of its vigorous drama and romance in the hands of the capable Otto Brower, who directed the production. In other hands this vehicle might have degenerated into blood and thunder. But Brower has made it real drama—the drama of life as it is lived, or rather as it was lived in those semi-barbarous times on the frontiers of the old Southwest. Wallace Beery turns in a fine performance as the good "bad" man of the production. His unscrupulous banditry is cold and calculating, but at the crucial moment he proves to be a man of generous and sympathetic heart, big enough to step aside and relinquish his dream of romance to the young Easterner who comes into the life of the girl Beery had loved. Jean Arthur and Phillips R. Holmes play the girl and the Easterner. Their work is excellent, and their further fortune in Paramount films seems assured as a result of their splendid performances. Chester Conklin, without his famous mustache, and Fred Kohler, with his customary leer, are strong characters for comedy and villainy in the picture. Their work is above the average for intelligence. Guy Oliver, Lillian Waller, Frank Rice and Clarence L. Sherwood furnish personable support. Whether you are a Zane Grey fan or not you will like this picture.
