ANNUAL MEETING ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS

The annual meeting of the Anti-tuberculosis Society for Queen's and King's Counties will be held in Charlottetown, on Thursday next the 13th inst. The regular business meeting will be at 11 a. m. in the Board of Trade rooms. A public meeting, to which everybody is cordially invited will be held in the Prince of Wales College Hall at 8 p. m. The program will consist of short addresses by prominent physicians on various phases of the Anti-tuberculosis movement, also vocal and instrumental music and readings. Stereoscopic views, accompanied by lucid descriptions of each, will be features of the evening. Premier Haszard will preside. Branch societies are entitled to send one delegate to the business meeting for every twenty-four members. There delegates should be appointed without delay.

WOMAN RUBBED OF HER TRESSSES

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan 6—Mrs. Wm. Ellen, 28 years of age, whose five-foot mass of blonde hair has been the envy and admiration of St. Louis women for years, was knocked unconscious and snatched of her locks by an unidentified man as she was leaving her home for church recently. Her hair was sawed off close to the scalp with a razor.

Mrs. Ellen was dragged unconscious into the hallway of her home and lay in that condition for an hour before she was found. Her condition is serious.

This attack was the third attempt in two weeks to steal Mrs. Ellen's hair. She was stopped on the street on a previous occasion by a man. He offered money for the hair, and the next time unsuccessfully attempted to slip off the tresses with shears.

ALLEGED BLACK HAND GANG

NEW YORK, Jan 6—By the arrest of three men in Brooklyn today the police believe they have the leaders of a black hand organization.

NEW HOSPITAL FOR TYPHOID FEVER

MONTREAL, Jan 6—The temporary hospital will be ready to receive its first patients tomorrow evening, and accommodations will be there secured for over three hundred patients. There have been thirteen new cases since January 1, and six deaths while there were 225 new cases for the week.

IF HOME RULE, WHY NOT ALL?

TORONTO, Jan 6—Lyon cables to the Globe from Ayrshire, the west of Scotland will not vote with a single eye to the issue of the Lords versus budget. Many Liberals here are greatly opposed to Irish home rule, except as part of a general scheme to give all divisions of Great Britain and Ireland control of local affairs, leaving the imperial affairs, this feeling unquestionably lessens Liberal enthusiasm in Ayrshire and adjacent countries. So far, however, there is no sign that the Lords are making any headway in Scotland generally, in the flight against the House of Commons. I can find no one in a responsible position who anticipates victory for the upper house.

JOKING MADE HIM INSANE

WORCESTER, Jan 6—Herbert W. Mero, an employe of the Sherman Envelope Company, was committed to the Worcester state hospital today as insane. Yesterday one of the firm employes "joked" him about his wedding, which took place Christmas. He became much agitated, and the joke was taken up by other employes. Last night he was found caving his prayers on a street corner, and tried to knock out two policemen who urged him to go home. He was arrested, examined and committed.

PEANUT SHELLS USED IN BREAKFAST FOODS

CHICAGO, Jan 6—The Chicago Federation of Labor yesterday adopted resolutions calling upon the National Pure Food Commission to investigate if peanut shells constitute the best element in the manufacture of breakfast foods.

"In a recent freight train wreck it was discovered that several cars consigned to breakfast food concerns were loaded with peanut shells from the peanut butter factories in the south," said President John Fitzpatrick.

SUCCESSFUL CANCER TREATMENT NEXT

MANILA, Jan 6—A conditional and preliminary report of what it is hoped will prove to be a successful specific treatment of cancer was presented before the Manila Medical Society tonight. The treatment consists in making the patient immune from the further progress of the disease by the use of vaccine prepared from his own cancer.

Experiments have been made with in cases where an operation was possible and where it was not. A variety in the matter of the progress of the disease has been afforded for experiment and the results have been uniformly encouraging.

A number of the patients who had been cured apparently, were exhibited before the society. The medical authorities here express a wish to watch these cases over an extended period for a possible recurrence of the malady before they accept the treatment as successful.

CHILDREN, BOY AND MAN FROZEN TO DEATH

WINNIPEG, Jan 7—Three little children were frozen to death at Yellow-Grass, near Regina, while going from their home to visit their grandparents two miles away.

Sheriff Whitehair of Winnipeg is missing and fears are entertained that he has perished.

Lawrence Thombly, sixteen years old, was frozen to death near Esneton. He went to look for the horses and failed to return.

M.P.A.A. HAS SHIFTED RESPONSIBILITY

PICOTU, Jan 6—"Let bygones be bygones, but in future beware." This is the slogan of the M.P.A.A. A., and the substance of the stand taken by this august body according to feelings expressed here last night at the special meeting called by the association. The attendance was slim, Charlottetown and Truro being the only clubs, outside of this county, represented.

President Johnson and Secretary McMillan are determined to draw the line between professionalism and amateurism, and it is only the matter of a little while, before the winning will commence. In the past the athletes, especially hockey players and baseball players, have practically had the clubs at their mercy, but now things are reversed. An athlete must agree to the conditions of the club, not the club to the conditions of the players, and "hold ups" are now impossible. The athlete must abide by the rules of the club and cannot skip to another club where he can do better. The decree has gone forth and the seal is set.

At the meeting held here last night, the following additional rules to the Maritime Province Amateur Athletic association's by-laws of registration of athletes were adopted. It is now up to the officers of the clubs to see that these are kept. The M.P.A.A. A. have opened the way. The additions to the by-laws are:

"No one shall be eligible to compete in any athletic meeting, game or entertainment given or sanctioned by this association unless he shall be a duly registered athlete and a member of the club or organization from which he enters or for which he competes. He shall not have competed, or for any other club or organization, nor shall he have registered as a member of any other club or organization during a period of three months preceding such entry or competition, nor shall any member of any club or organization in the maritime provinces be allowed to compete as a member of any other club or organization within the maritime provinces, except with the consent of such other club or organization, which consent shall be filed with the secretary of this association prior to such competition, unless such other club or organization shall have disbanded or rationally ceased to exist.

"The requirements of this section shall not apply to any athletic meeting, game or entertainment, the entries for which are confined to the members of the club or organization giving such meeting or entertainment.

"Any athlete registered from a club may, while a student in actual attendance at any school, college or university compete for such school, college or university, if he so desires.

"Persons changing their residence may be released by the club from which they were registered, providing such changes of residence was not sought about for athletic purposes, or because of inducements offered or given by any athletic organization. Such release shall be granted by the association only upon the written recommendation of the officers of the club under which such person was registered.

"Every athlete requiring registration shall apply for same through the secretary of his club, and shall neither be allowed to change the club nor compete unattached during the term of registration without the consent of his club. Unattached men and members of unaffiliated clubs must before registration be recommended by the sub-committee of the district in which registration cards are good for one year from date of issue. All applications for registration (unless otherwise provided) must be accompanied by a fee of twenty-five cents."

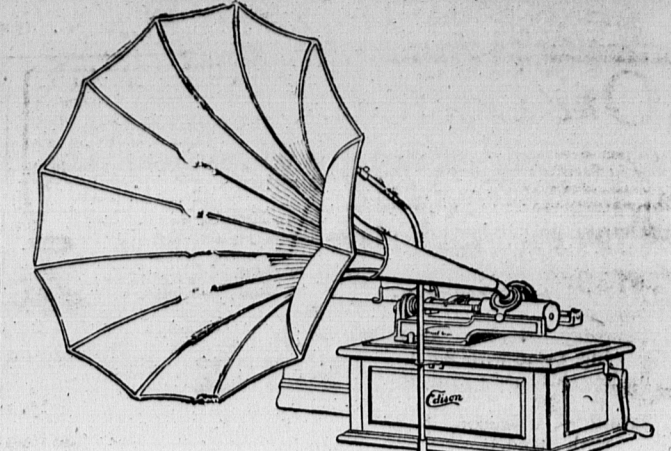
