"DISASTROUS FIRE AVERTED What might have been a disastrous fire was prevented on Saturday afternoon by the quick action of the Montague Fire Department when a waste disposal near Griffin's mill caught on fire with the wind carrying flames and hot cinders toward a populated section of the town. The fire was noticed by one of the residents who immediately sounded the alarm, and the chemical was rushed to the scene, preventing the fire from spreading to the adjacent warehouse and mill which had they caught would have been difficult to bring under control. The main engine arrived a few minutes later and under the capable direction of Mr. George MacIntyre, Fire Chief, Mr. Tom Clair, local constable, Mr. Joseph Vuozic and Mr. Ted McEwen, the fire was quickly brought under control to the relief of many residents in the danger area.

A machine which records visually the activity of the brain has been made by scientists of the Burden Neurological Institute at Bristol, England. It is a development of the electroencephalograph and has 80 adjustable electrodes, some 200 valves and 24 cathode ray tubes. The electrodes are fitted to the patient's head and a picture of the brain is thrown on a screen where it can be studied by the doctors. It is believed this machine may revolutionize the present treatment of brain disorders. If installed in every hospital it will not be necessary for all people suspected of serious brain disorder to travel to specialist hospitals for examination. One of the inventors is Harold Shipton, son-in-law of Prime Minister Attlee. — UK Information Office.
