SASKATOON, Sept. 8 (CP) - Most Rev. George Frederick Kingston, tall, broad-shouldered Bishop of Nova Scotia, tonight was installed as primate of the Church of England in Canada in a service at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist which embodied the communion.

After singing of professional hymns, the recital of the Apostles' Creed and Lord's Prayers, Very Rev. C.E. Riley, dean of St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, paid tribute to Archbishop Kingston, as a man of "stunning character and wide experience."

He will be the presiding bishop over our fathers in God most in consultation, and spokesman for the whole church when it is required that the church speak with a united voice.

In a tribute to the late Archbishop Derwyn T. Owen of Toronto, who the white-haired Archbishop Kingston succeeds as seventh primate, the Dean said: "Thought of us who know him can never forget him, nor his influence on the lives of many persons to whom he reflected the beauty of the in-dwelling Christ."
