THE TUNNEL TRACK HORSES SWEEP THE RACE COURSE CLEAN

John P. Irving, Trainer and Proprietor of Tunnel Track, Cape Travers, Won \$415.00 From \$600.00 Purses With Kalol, Queen Marie, Slippery Side, and Cock of the North-Brazilian Owned by Gordon T. Ives, Montague Performed a Wonderful Feat.

The Exhibition Association was favored with excellent weather yesterday for their races. There were about 200 people in attendance, the smallest on the records of the Association.

Starter Power, called the 2.26 trot and 2.28 pace, at two o'clock sharp. Through some misunderstanding with driver Cameron, who took his horses away this caused a delay of over half an hour and the starter called the 2.20 trot. Half an hour, waiting for a race at this season of the year is not pleasant and the remarks from all sides were rather caustic in tone.

First Heat. The horses got away on first score. Cock of the North with the pole, Brazilian second, Parkharlando third and Kalol in fourth position. Cock O' the North held the pole until the 1/2 mark with Brazilian, full of his old time grit and speed at his wheel. Here Brazilian showed his mettle by taking the lead and holding it to the wire.

Cock O' the North finished in second position, Parkharlando third, Kalol fourth. On the first turn Kalol made a bad break and lost badly. Time 36; 1.12; 1.48; mile 2.25.

2.20 TROT. In the second heat the horses got away on the fourth score. Kalol took the pole on the first turn, which he held until the finish, with Brazilian at his wheel, Cock of the North third and Parkharlando fourth. It was a great heat between Kalol and Brazilian. Time 35; 1.10; 1.46; mile 2.23.

2.20 TROT. Third heat. It took several scores to get the horses away. Kalol held the pole to the finish being several lengths ahead. It was a good race for second position between Brazilian and Cock of the North, the latter winning. Parkharlando was away behind. Time 35; 1.10; 1.46; 2.23.

FREIGHT RATE WAR IN PACIFIC

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20-A rate war in the Pacific, with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company opposing the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, a subsidizing line of Japan, is expected. The Japanese company is reported to have made a cut of 20 per cent in freight rates, and the Pacific Mail is reported to have instructed its oriental agents to meet any reduction made. With further cuts and counter cuts in prospect the commercial war is regarded on this coast as of the utmost importance owing to the diminishing American marine and the constant improvement and increased facilities of the Japanese steamship lines. The Pacific Mail, however, has the backing of the Harriman system and is expected to meet the opposition in an effort to retain its business.

SIR CHARLES SEES THE KING

LONDON, October 20-Sir Charles Tupper attended at Buckingham Palace today, and was sworn in a member of the privy council, to which he was appointed last King's birthday. His Majesty King Edward showed special consideration and kindness. In a prior intimation to Sir Charles, his majesty said that seeing his difficulty in kneeling during the ceremony of kissing hands, he wished him to bring his stick on entering and leaving the chamber.

CLASH OVER CITY'S MEAT INSPECTION

MONTREAL, Oct. 20-At the meeting of the Hygiene Committee yesterday, the question of meat inspection came up for consideration. The Government has the right to have inspectors at the city abattoirs, as well as the city, and the question now is as to which inspectors have the real and final authority to pass or reject meat destined for consumption in Montreal.
