DEATH OF J. W. P. BALDERSTON.

It is our sorrowful duty to announce
the sudden and altogether unexpected
death of Mr. John Wesley Pope Balder-
ston, which occurred at Kennell early on
Monday.

When Mr. Balderston was in town
some days ago a few of his most intimate
friends learned that he was unwell and
in consultation with a physician. He
looked quite well, but his insidious ail-
ment was of the dropical type.

His powerful frame and vigorous con-
stitution had for many years withstood
hardship and exposure during long drives
incidental to his occupation as an exten-
sive dealer in cattle. It can be readily
understood therefore how reluctant a man
in the prime of life vigorous and full of
buoyant hope would be yielded to the subtle
though increasingly evident advances
of disease. On going back to the ranch he
became worse and though medical aid was
promptly obtained complications set in
and the patient suffered rapidly.

Mr. Balderston was born in North Wil-
shire Prince Edward Island, thirty-six
years ago where his parents and numer-
ous relatives reside. His father Hon John
Balderston was a member of the Legisla-
tive Council or Upper House of that pro-
vince for many years and was President
of the Council during his last term retir-
ing from politics after the emerging of
that body with the Legislative Assembly.

The deceased came west about nine
years ago. He was associated in business
at first with Mr. F. N. Darke and latterly
with Mr. Sinton. In 1894 he married
Miss Amanda J. Drake and in the course
of time acquired a comfortable home on
Albert Street. During the past year they
resided chiefly at the ranch as Mr.
Balderston's presence was frequently re-
quired, owing to the increasing volume
of business. He was known far and wide.
His business took him into many homes,
and his sunny disposition always made
him a welcome guest with rich or poor
young or old. He was particularly fond
of children and wherever he went they
clung fondly and familiarly to "Pop."
That he was deeply attached to his own
two little girls and to her who is to-day
a disconsolate widow, enduring the sorest
affliction that ever befalls an affectionate
wife, need not be said, for it was amply
evident.

Dr. Cotton, who was hurriedly called
out on Saturday remained in attendance
to the last, and when he could no more
render kindly services to Mr. Balderston
aiden regarding funeral arrangements
and in despatching the sad news to distant
relatives. Sympathetic replies have been
received from Rev. Hedley Balderston,
Greenwood, B. C. and Dr. Stephen Balder-
ston, Evanston, Illinois, both brothers of
the deceased. A younger brother, Egerton
is here.

The writer well knows what a place the
deceased had in the affection of his now
aging parents. It will be a measure of
consolation to them to know that Mr.
and Mrs. Balderston made many friends
in this new land, and that to-day a large
concourse of kind people pay a tribute of
respect to the departed.—Regina Standard.

CHURCH WILL BE PRESERVED.

The Boston correspondent of the St.
John Sun writes: The corporation of St.
Paul's Church on Tremont Street the his-
toric old edifice which was erected in 1819
has decided to refuse an offer of \$1,500,000
for the property. The general sentiment
was that the Church should not be moved
to another part of the city. St. Paul's stands
in the business section and has long been
one of the landmarks. The present Bishop
of Nova Scotia, Rt. Rev. Frederic Cour-
tney D. D., was for several years rector of
the Church. The present rector is Rev. John
S. Lindsay, and the curate Rev. Mr. Ket-
chum.

RAID ON LIQUOR HOUSES.

TOPEKA, Kansas, February 27.—J. W.
Adams was fatally wounded during a raid
on the Curtis wholesale liquor house at
midnight last night. A carload of beer
had been unoaded during the day and
about fifteen men, armed with sledges and
revolvers, broke open the door and smas-
hed the cases. Adams says he was shot
by a policeman. Rev. F. W. Emerson
was also hurt, but not seriously.
