LEFT LEGACY FOR CEMETERY—The 13th issue of the United Churchman for the month of November was recently received by Mr. H. D. McLean, Chairman of the Souris P. E. I. West Protestant Cemetery Committee. Dr. George D. Muttart, died a few months ago in East Boston, where he practised his profession for many years and was a well known citizen. His bequest recalls to memory the honourable place long occupied by the Muttart family in the church and community of Souris for an extended period. Dr. E. B. Muttart, the father of Dr. George was family physician and friend to the people of this end of the island. Dr. Muttart represented King's County in the Federal Parliament. He also served on the Official Board of the Methodist Church in Charlottetown. Dr. Muttart died in Souris in 1937. He had been mayor of Souris and Choir Leader in St. James Church at the time of his death in 1938. This family is now extinct, but their memory is cherished by many former friends not only in Souris but throughout the Maritime Provinces. The souls of righteous are in the hands of God and they shall receive a Kingdom from the Lord's own hand.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES REPORTED—Epidemics of scarlet fever, whooping cough and chicken pox are prevalent in different sections of the Province. Dr. Keeping, Deputy Minister of Public Health, disclosed last night. No deaths have been reported however, and the diseases are reported to be of a mild type. At present there are 12 houses quarantined against scarlet fever in the City. During this week it is the intention of the Public Health Department to carry on active immunization of children in the City Schools to prevent the spread of the disease. Dr. Keeping announced. There are five cases of scarlet fever in one house at Borden but no new cases have been reported in the country lately. Churches reopened in Murray Harbor yesterday and schools will open there tomorrow after three weeks suspension of classes owing to the large number of cases in that community. Georgetown where the disease first appeared is reported to be free of the disease. Dr. Keeping reported twelve cases of chicken pox in Rustico with no reports of the disease elsewhere in the Province. Epidemics of whooping cough are prevalent in Pownal, Village Green, Bonshaw and Churchill. There have been no cases of diphtheria on Prince Edward Island this year, Dr. Keeping said last night.

At the morning service of Trinity United Church the speaker was Rev. Dr. D. G. Cook, D. D., missionary of the United Church of Canada who has labored in Newfoundland, Labrador, and the Yukon and who has given many years of his life in bring the word of God to the peoples of India. Dr. Cook had a glowing story to tell of the marvelous work in which the teeming depressed millions of that great land are flocking to the Master. The speaker told of a Mahomedan priest who traveled through the length and breadth of the Holy Land seeking a revelation of God and how he found it upon the hill of Calvary. He related also how hundreds of the ancient tribes of India are ever flocking to the Christian Leaders seeking for the way of freedom from the bondage of Hinduism. One incident of special interest for all British subjects was put forth by Dr. Cook, when he told of a large room in the House of Commons of the British Parliament where once a week the members have gathered for one hundred and five years, regularly, once each week for voluntary prayer to God for strength in their work of government. This room Dr. Cook spoke of as the powerhouse of the Empire. By these stirring incidents the speaker made a powerful and moving appeal for the continuation of the missionary work in India. The music of the choir was especially helpful and enriching to the worship of God. The choir sang Herbert Sanders beautiful anthem "Was there ever kindest Shepherd" and Miss Margaret Sterns gave a fine rendition of the soprano part of the anthem. Mr. George Johnson splendidly sang the delightful anthem "The Holy City." At the evening service Rev. Hugh Miller delivered an excellent sermon on the theme "The Search For Life." In this the minister told of the full life is not to be found in an abundance of material possessions but in the example of the fullness of the stature of Christ. The evening anthem was "Praise Ye The Lord," and Miss Edna Burke was the alto soloist. The organ selections of the organist, Mr. A. R. Kendall were fine tributes to his musical skill.
