Why Don't Parents Revolt?

Once a Couple Have Negotiated the First Ten Years of Marriage, They Think They Are Safe for the Rest of Their Lives; But Let Them Beware the Perilous Thirties, When Many a Matrimonial Venture Goes on the Rocks

What is the most dangerous time in marriage? German statisticians have discovered that the hardest years are from the fifth to the tenth of married life, at least in Germany.



Being a younger, a more impulsive and a more undisciplined people, we begin to get dissatisfied with our matrimonial bargains sooner than the Germans do, and I should say that in this country the time of greatest peril to marriage is between the second and the fifth years. Let no young couple, however, who have safely negotiated this storm center, congratulate themselves that all danger is past, and that the balance is fair sailing.

Generally speaking, the honeymoon begins to wane about the time the bride's trousseau commences to give out and get shabby, and the bridegroom discovers that marriage is a job and not a romance.

There was the thrill and excitement of getting married, and the wonder of having each other to themselves, and the fun of starting to house-keeping and the marvel of what Mr. Walter Winchell calls "blessed evening."

They quarreled and kissed and made up and the kick of the reconciliation compensated for the tears and reproaches and home truths they told each other, and they still had the sex allure for each other that first drew them together.

But by the end of the second year the novelty of marriage has worn off and the romance is at tattered as the chiffons of the wife's wedding finery. They know all of each other's moods and tempers and there are a lot of them that they don't like.

The gay adventure isn't so gay any more. It is a dull, hard grind of cooking and washing and scrubbing and baby-tending and punching the time clock and worry over the rent and the doctor's bills and seeing everything you make go for the actual necessities of life.

BYRON DISLIKED VAMPIRES

BUTTE, Mont., May 4.—(U.P.)—If the literary world is unaware of the fact—George Noel Gordon Byron, immortal English poet, disliked vampires.

This was revealed here when Harry B. Henderson, holder of the Cornelius F. Kelley research fellowship in ore dressing at Montana School of Mines, thumbed the pages of a faded letter.

The epistle, apparently written hastily, is dated Venice, April 27, 1819, and addressed to Monsieur Galliani, at that time publisher of the Messenger, Paris.

Byron, the letter would indicate, was incensed that the Messenger should advertise a book, "The Vampire," as the work of his hand. In part he wrote:

"If the book is clever, it would be base to deprive the real writer, who ever he may be, of his honors, and if stupid, I desire the responsibility of nobody's dullness but my own."

Byron further wrote that he had a personal dislike for vampires, and "the little acquaintance I have had with them would by no means induce me to divulge their secrets."

Among the factors which contribute to the huge total of chick loss annually, most of which are preventable, are included chicks stolen; chicks poisoned from eating salt, rat poison, paint from old cans, drinking sour milk from galvanized dishes; chicks drowned in puddles or so chilled in rains that they die; chicks stepped on by attendants, horses or other animals; chicks hung in wire netting; chicks burned through carelessness in operating the brooder; chicks drowned in too large drinking vessels, pails, barrels, or other receptacles carelessly left filled with water near the chicken runs; and chicks killed by dogs, cats, rats, skunks, foxes, raccoons, hawks, crows, owls, weavels, etc. Look over your plant and equipment, try to foresee
