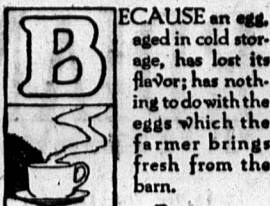

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader a good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section on alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained upon such homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

TEACHER THIRTY YEARS IN ONE SCHOOL

Sister Mary Rosella Mackler, who died August 22, was buried from St. Michael's Church, N. J.

Children of St. Michael's Parochial Schools of West Hoboken, N. J., as well as a number of men and women who received their early education in the institution, were among the chief mourners at the funeral of Sister Mary Rosella Mackler, which took place August 24.

A solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated in St. Michael's Monastery Church at 9.30 o'clock. Rev. Fr. Justinian, C. J., rector, was the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Fr. Julius C. P., as deacon and Rev. Fr. Edwin, C. P., sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. Oswin, C. P., was master of ceremonies.

Sister Mary Rosella Mackler had in Palmer Road Paris, Prince Edward Island, came to West Hoboken thirty years ago and spent all her religious life in St. Michael's Parish. During all those years, she taught in the parochial school and there are many men and women, now prominent in business, who received their first lessons from her.

Sister Mary Rosell Mackler had been in poor health for some time. She was forced to give up her work as teacher about a month before the schools closed for the summer vacation and went to the Mother House at Madison. Physicians attending her stated that an operation was necessary, so she was conveyed to St. Joseph's Hospital in Paterson, New Jersey.

The religious woman was found to be suffering from a cancer, and lived only a short time after the operation was performed. Her death occurred at 2.40 o'clock Thursday morning. (Journal and Pioneer please copy.)

"Bacon for me," chirruped the one. "I see they've lifted the restrictions off it. Why they ever put them on goodness only knows. It's crazy to have laws like that. They're not needed."

Crazy, was it? They would hardly seem to be to any one who knows the facts. As a result of these restrictions and the educational propaganda of the Canada Food Board, the export of bacon overseas was increased in the last year by 571 per cent as compared with the pre-war average exports.

Moreover, every pound of it was needed on the other side and every pound of it has helped in the winning of the war.

WAR CANNING BULLETIN

WORK WHILE YOU PLAY

This industrious lady makes hay while the sun shines. In other words, she manages to sandwich in some work while she is also enjoying herself. The moral is, keep on canning right through the season. Fruit and vegetables can be prepared for canning as easily in the cool of the verandah as in the hot kitchen.

Here is the recipe for a fruit conserve that is a medley of sundry things:

- 2 lbs. peaches, 1/2 lb apples
2 lbs. quinces, 3 lemons
1 1/2 lbs pears, 4 1/2 lbs sugar

Wash and prepare the fruit. Pass through a food chopper and weigh. To each pound of fruit allow three-quarters of a pound of sugar. Put fruit and sugar in alternate layers in a bowl and allow to stand overnight. Next morning place in a preserving kettle with the pulp of the lemons and one-half the ring sliced in thin strips. Boil until the mixture becomes very thick. One cupful of scalded chopped nuts may be added, if desired, five minutes before removing from the fire. Pack into sterilized jars and seal at once.

OPENING EXERCISES AT PRINCE ST. SCHOOL

Yesterday's inclement weather did not deter the interested parents and friends of the pupils of Prince Street School from gathering in the large reception hall for the public opening of this popular school for 1918-1919.

The children although only in school for a week acquitted themselves well, the order and singing reflecting much credit on the capable staff of teachers.

Dr. McMillan presided and in an interesting speech spoke of the splendid work being done by Prince Street School and how necessary it was that even greater efforts be put forth in the future, remembering that success was only won by hard work and close study in the evening hours. He referred to the regrettable absence of Mr. Henry Smith and to the sorrow which his family were now undergoing. Regrets were also read from Consul Pierce who was unavoidably absent.

Dr. McMillan then presented to Miss Besse Seaman, the City School Board's prize of \$25 for the highest marks made in the Matriculation examinations, and congratulated her on her successful studies.

Prof. H. H. Shaw, acting Superintendent of Education, was the next speaker and his address was most warmly applauded. He commended the pupils on their good work and impressed upon them the great necessity of having a right aim in life, to forgo the cheap pleasures of life and seek after things that make life worth while and a blessing to others. He appealed to the trustees to keep keenly awake to the responsibilities of their office for on them depended the success of school work.

He spoke at length on the success and right valuation of success and hoped the time would come when the schools could do away with eternal examinations. Prof. Shaw thought that those who had brought honour and success to their schools should have their names enrolled so that in future years the younger generations would be familiar with the founders of education in this Province.

Mayor Wright also paid a tribute to the good work of P. S. S. and was followed by Mr. Paton, M. L. A., Dr. Fullerton, Col. Moore, Mr. James and Mr. Gordon, each of whom made short but interesting speeches. All the speakers paid tribute to the name of Seaman and all it means to education in this Province, one speaker suggesting that a Scroll of Honor be inaugurated at once with Miss Bessie Seaman's name in first place.

A pleasing feature was the list of prizes kindly offered by the following gentlemen:— Mr. Paton, M. L. A. two prizes—one for Domestic Science and a second in cash for an essay on Sir Walter Scott.

Mr. Gordon for highest marks in Grade 8. Someone, name unknown, offers a similar prize for Grade 7, through Mayor Wright.

Mayor Wright continues his prize for Grade 9. The pleasant afternoon's exercises were brought to a fitting close with the National Anthem.

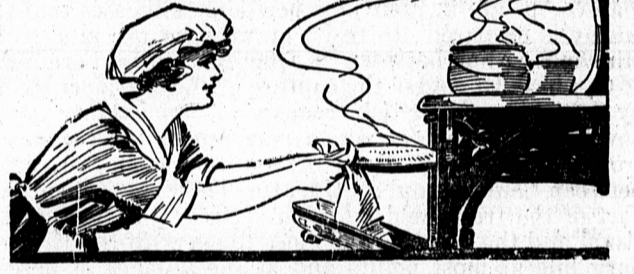
