Civil Service Examinations.

There were four candidates present at the Higher Grade Examination held on Wednesday last. The subjects for this grade are, Penmanship, Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, History, Grammar, orthography, Transcription. Following are the papers in composition and arithmetic.

COMPOSITION.

- 1. Sentences as regards their significance are divided into four classes, viz.: Declaration, Interrogative, Imperative and Exclamatory. Give an example of each. 2. Distinguish between a grammatical and logical subject of a sentence. Give an example of each. 3. (b) He informed me that they returned back again to the same city from whence they came forth. (c) It must be acknowledged that avarice is a vice which wise men are often guilty of. 4. Write a letter to a friend, of not fewer than 250 words, "On the visit to Canada of the Duke and Duchess of York and Cornwall."

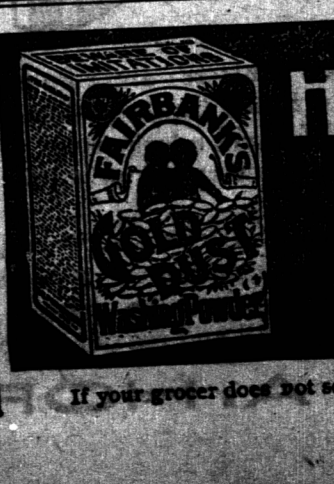
