McKenzie was accused of conducting a suit club, and it is understood that he has agreed to discontinue conducting the same.—Pat. 5th. -At a well attended meeting of the Dunk River Farmers' Institute, held at North Bedeque on Friday last, the following resolution was unanimously carried:—Whereas: Many farmers in this Province are offering a very inferior quality of farm products to the purchasing public; and whereas: In the opinion of this meeting, a great loss annually occurs from the fact that such products are placed upon the markets, owing to there being no system of grading the same, the innocent suffering with the guilty; Therefore, Resolved: That we memorialize the Government to supply by legislation or otherwise a system of inspection for all farm products exported. -Owing to errors in transmission by telephone the following is repeated: The death occurred Thursday after an illness of several weeks of Geo. Stavert, one of Summerside's oldest and respected citizens. 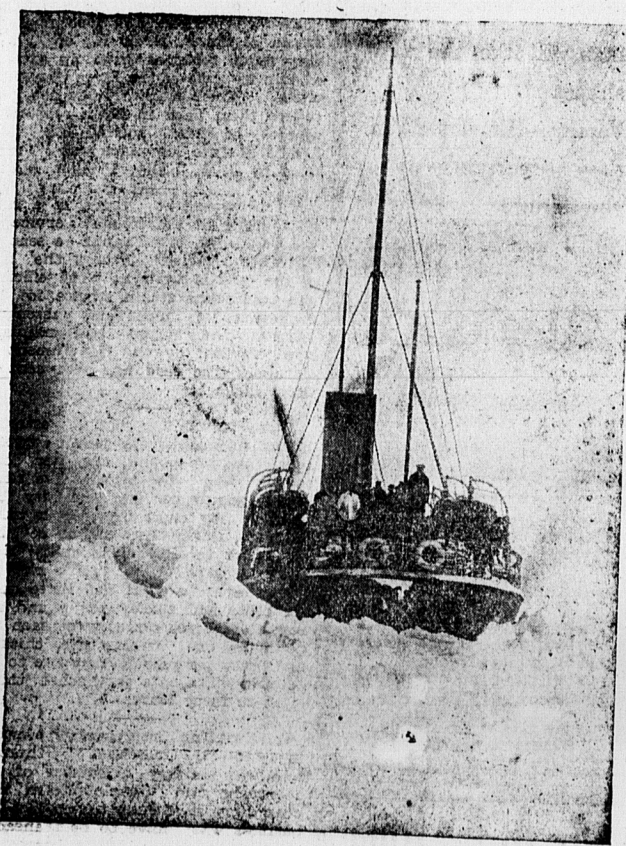

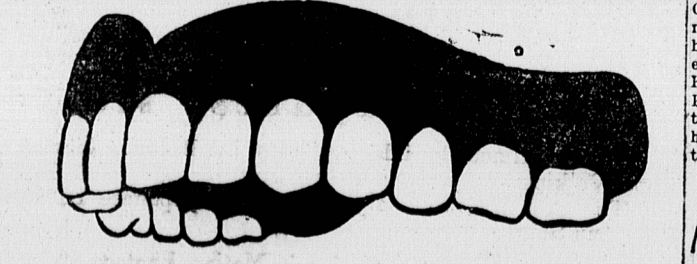
