EXTENSIVE improvements will shortly be made to the Baptist Church at Tryon which when completed will make it one of the most commodious and comfortable in that section of the province. The contract has been left to J. M. Clark & Co., of Summerside and the cost of the work will be more than \$2000. To the south side of the present building which is 30 x 40 ft. a vestry facing the pulpit, with folding doors and 18 x 22 feet in size will be built. To the north an annex will be added which will give good space for choir and pulpit. A tower, seventy feet high, on the south west corner, will give an imposing appearance to the edifice and new windows with chipped glass, new hardwood ceiling, and hardwood seats will further beautify the interior. The foundation will be completed by May 15 and the contract calls for the finishing of the work by Sept. 15. The building committee and the pastor, Rev. John Clark as well as the entire congregation are to be congratulated upon the handsome church which they will shortly occupy.
