IN MEMORIAM

MR. ANGUS MACKAY.

There passed away very suddenly at Port Huron, Mich. on March 24th 1927 Mr. Angus Mackay formerly of High Bank P. E. I. Born in Koss Vinton June 27th 1847. He removed with his young wife and his parents to High Bank, where he received his early education, after attending the Normal school at Charlottetown he taught school for a few years in the Province.

He went to Port Huron, Mich. in 1889, and was employed in the office of the County Clerk for three years, after which he taught school in Lexington Mich.

In 1876 he entered the Insurance and Real Estate business which he conducted up to the time of his death.

On the morning of his death he stepped from the elevator going to his office when he was stricken with paralysis he was carried to his home, doctors were with him at once, but he passed away within an hour.

For over 50 years he was a member of Pine Grove Lodge A. F. and he was a member of the Presbyterian Church in 1884 he married Miss Alva J. Bowers of Tipton, Ont. who survives him together with two sons and one daughter. One brother John Mackay High Bank and one sister Miss Janet McKay High Bank, also survive him.

His last visit to his island home was about twenty years ago, but he always kept in close touch with the affairs of his native province. Much sympathy is felt for his family, brothers and sisters in their sorrow.

The music at the funeral services was most effectively rendered by members of the choir of South Lake and Kingsboro Churches. The Hymns were:—

"There is a land that is fairer than day."

"O think of the home over there."

"We are going down the Valley one by one."

"Tarry with me Blessed Savior."

The very large congregation, as they paid their tribute of respect to his memory demonstrated the esteem and honor in which the deceased was held.

Interment was made in South Lake Cemetery.
