## TRAFFIC EXPERT PREDICTS SAVING

Claims Transportation Commission Will Show Saving of \$100,000 To Shippers and Producers.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) **FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 28**—As a preliminary step in the formation of an organization to be known as the Associated Board of Trade of the Saint John River Valley and western New Brunswick, an executive committee consisting of the presidents of those boards, with power to add to their number, was selected at a representative meeting here today.

Transportation problems were dealt with at considerable length today and the gathering heard an address by Rand H. Matheson, traffic expert of the Maritime Transportation Commission, who announced that at Moncton on September 16, the commission would review with shippers and marketing officials of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, a case which would be presented before the board of railway commissioners possibly on October 20 in an endeavor to have the Maritime freight rate on potatoes reduced five cents per 100 pounds to equalize it with a reduced rate now in effect in Ontario and Quebec.

At the next annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade to be held at Halifax early in October, Mr. Matheson said he hoped to be able to show a saving of at least \$100,000 to Maritime producers and shippers as a result of the activities of the Transportation Commission. He spoke of freight and express rate difficulties which the commission was attempting to rectify.

The committee will meet in the near future with the prospect that another general meeting will be held before the end of October.

Delegates from six boards attended today's gathering, which included a luncheon with more than 60 present, and a business conference. Suggestions made at this conference with respect to tourist traffic and other matters of W. W. Hubbard, S. S. Miller and Alexander Murray, president, vice-president and secretary, respectively, of the Fredericton Board of Trade.

Among other things, the government will be urged to complete the hard surfacing of the main trunk highways of the province as soon as possible and to institute some scheme to induce farmers of the province to set out shade trees along the highways as a means of beautifying the countryside.

### G-Men Locate Body Of Desperado

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 28**—The body of John Hamilton, Dillinger gang member, was found buried near Oswego, Illinois, today by "G-men."

Word was given at the Department of Justice in late afternoon by J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Bureau of Investigation. He said the body was badly decomposed.

Agents reported a belief Hamilton, a native of Ontario's Sault Ste. Marie district, was probably killed in a battle with some of their colleagues during their hot chase of the Dillinger gang in the summer of 1934.

Their opinion was that the long-sought criminal met his end either in the battle which occurred near Little Bohemia, Wis., or at a subsequent battle near St. Paul, Minn.

**BERRY PICKERS TREK NORTHWARD**

**REGINA, Aug. 29**—(CP)—Berry pickers from central Saskatchewan towns take the bus to the north. This year they are trekking north to the wild fruit areas of the bushland, some of them striking 200 miles north. Each party, carrying equipment in motor trucks, counts on obtaining 400 to 500 quarts of berries.

Favorite goal of the berry pickers in the big-time expeditions in the north is the Nipawin and White Fox districts around the Saskatchewan river north of Melfort. In this district pickers from the southern prairie farms and villages seek a year's supply of wild fruit.

They preserve the berries right on the spot, in the spruce and jack-pine country. Equipment includes camping gear, preserving kettles, stoves, dishes, food for several days, plenty of pickers and plenty of sugar. In recent years the custom of combining berry-picking with a vacation has been

### NO LABOR PROBLEMS FOR CAPABLE HEAD OF NEEDLEWORK BUSINESS

**NEW YORK, Aug. 28**—Ida Jolles said today that her own success story began when as a child, she read in a German book: "You

have to feel strong. You have to want strongly; for then you can obtain anything you wish."

At 38, Mrs. Jolles, a native of Vienna, now heads a needlework business that employs 20,000 Austrian women. Recently she was decorated with the Austrian Cross

of Honor.

On her eleventh visit to this city, she said: "I have no labor problems, for I give my women workers proper wages. We make money. We let them make money. I never have believed that there is just one side of a proposition."

The European business woman started her "factory" in her living room—a corner by the piano—when her two children were babies 15 years ago. She now has 65 branch managers in major Austrian cities.
