Islander Killed In Moosejaw

A short time ago the unfortunate death of Mr. Everett Smallwood was announced. Since then a Moosejaw newspaper, where his death occurred, has come to hand, and it contains the particulars given below.

The late Mr. Everett Smallwood was the second eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Smallwood of Mount Stewart, Prince Edward Island. He left here about eight years ago, and located in Moosejaw, Sask. The family that are left to mourn his untimely death are his parents and his brother Ray, all in the old home.

FELL FROM POWER HOUSE; DIES OF HIS INJURIES

Everett Smallwood, Foreman Carpenter Employed by P. W. Graham on Extension to Power House, Fell Thirty Feet to Death on Tuesday.

Losing his balance while working on the roof of the new extension to the City Power house, Manitoba St. East, Everett Smallwood, 1948 Sixth Avenue, N. W., foreman carpenter, plunged to his death on the wooden flooring thirty feet below, Tuesday morning. Death was not instantaneous but came within a few minutes of the accident, which occurred about 9.45. He was employed by P. W. Graham, contractor for the extension of the Power House.

Assisted by a number of other workers Mr. Smallwood was placing metal roof sheeting over the steel girders which formed the skeleton of the roof for the new extension. To do this he was forced to walk the girders or purlins, as they are known among builders—steel forms which are about four or five inches in width and about three feet apart. In some way he stepped into the open space between two of the purlins and fell almost headlong to the floor.

It appears that the man struck the floor in a crumpled position with his head and one leg coming into contact with the surface floor. One leg was broken in many places and there were bruises about his face. Fellow workers rushed to his help immediately and Bellamy's Ambulance reached the scene within five minutes. Death came before he could be taken to the hospital.

Mr. Smallwood was a married man with a family of four small children. He was well known in the city, having been connected with the erection of many buildings here, and had been at work at the power plant all winter. He was foreman carpenter for the late S. P. Richard when the latter fell to his death in the St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church.

Funeral arrangements, which will be in the hands of Bellamy's, have not been completed as yet. The late Mr. Everett Smallwood was in the very prime of his manhood, being only thirty-two years of age. He was a man of admirable character, and industrious habits. His death is not only a great shock and sorrow to his own people, but also to all who knew him during the years that he lived at home.

To the bereaved we extend our sincerest sympathy.

LONDON, April 2.—An Italian painter has achieved notoriety and created a social sensation by a few strokes of his brush.

He received a commission to do some panel painting on the walls and ceilings of a fashionable hotel in Rome, and in accordance with the prevailing vogue most of his decorative work consisted of groups of feminine figures in the nude.

The artistic manner in which the work was performed earned the high approval of the hotel authorities, who, with pride, invited a number of experts to view the paintings.

At first site the connoisseurs were enthusiastically approving, but closer inspection provided them with a startling surprise. The faces of the nymphs were strangely familiar. The features of the nude figures it was seen in fact, bore a startling resemblance to prominent women in Roman society.

Either consciously, or unconsciously, the painter had taken the prominent beauties as his models. A princess, a countess, the wives of several high state officials, and other social celebrities now emblazoned the walls and ceilings of nymphs and dryads in a state of undress in which they would never have appeared in public.
