MR. NEIL THOMAS

A very deep gloom was cast over Augustines Cove and surrounding districts on April 21st, 1947, when it was learned that one of its eldest, and most respected citizens had passed on to his Eternal Reward. Although not in the best of health for some time death came without any warning, and on the above mentioned date his spirit winged its way to God. The late Mr. Thomas was born on October 22nd, 1868, and was the son of the late Philip Thomas and Rachel Lefurgy. Mr. Thomas was a man that was loved by both young and old and all the little children loved to be in his company because he was always cheerful and of a loving nature. 3. WASH RAW FRUITS AND VEGETABLES—before eating.
4. AVOID NEW CONTACTS—Avoid all crowds, especially indoors. Do not take children to theatres, on trains, buses, crowded boats and beaches or any place they will mingle with strangers.
5. DON'T GET OVERTIRED—Fatigue from too strenuous play, swimming, late hours, etc., makes you an easier victim to attack by polio.
6. AVOID CHILLING—Don't stay long in very cold water. Don't swim when overheated.
7. AVOID SWIMMING IN POOLS AND SWIMMING HOLES—Do not swim in polluted waters.
8. KEEP CLEAN—Wash hands before eating and after going to toilet.
