ever, a matter of simple preparation and microscopical observation, which is absolutely infallible.

The reader probably learnt at school that all human blood consists of two kinds of densely packed globules invisible to the naked eye, called corpuscles, white and red, floating or suspended in a liquid, I doubt whether one person in a million—apart from those who study such topics—has any real idea of the minuteness of these objects.

It has not only to be determined whether a suspected substance is blood and not rust or paint—which in themselves are capable of affording direct evidence of their own nature—but it has to be learnt whether the blood is that of a human being or of a rabbit, fowl or other creature. Fortunately, the shape of the corpuscles differ, slightly or extremely. Another important fact is that human blood responds less readily to the crystallization process outlined than do other kinds, and moreover, does so differently.

TO EXTERMINATE THE RAT.

All of peppermint generously applied to every hole and crack around the floors where rats are likely to frequent, it is an unusually good way to exterminate the rats. It should be applied from garret to cellar. The odor of peppermint will be pretty strong at first, but it possesses the advantage of not being entirely offensive and is certainly the lesser evil of the two.

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PLANET PROBLEMS.

"The amount of ignorance not yet removed concerning the planets is very great," writes E. S. Grew. "We do not know, for example, whether the planet Venus rotates. If it does it may possibly have a life and a vegetation like our own, though we suspect that it is clothed in eternal cloud. Of Saturn's rings we cannot say whether they consist of millions of tiny moons like brickbats or whether they may be even smaller still—a veil of shining dust. Of Jupiter we can only say that it is covered with clouds, though of their substance we know nothing, and, according to Professor Lowell and Sir William Huggins, some of the bands we see in it may be rifts in the clouds revealing the body of the planet. Little ones criss-cross these bands. Photographs of Jupiter taken at Flagstaff observatory seem to indicate that these lines, too, are the upper clouds of Jupiter."

"But whenever we see a planet we see it badly. Even Mars, the most clearly revealed of them all, is constantly obscured by a refracting haze, so that even of the famous 'canals,' though nearly 500 in number, only a few are perceptible at a time, and an unskilled observer would probably not make them out at all. Sand storms, sometimes snow storms, sweep the surface of the planet, and because the winds of Mars are very gentle and slow moving these occurrences take a long time to pass by."
