WAVE OF CRIME IN THE OLD COUNTRY. LONDON, Jan. 25.—It is learned here that a former resident of Toronto figures as a victim of one of several brutal crimes which have been occurring so frequently here and have caused considerable quiet.

The husband states that the dead woman was a Miss Frances Foote, who in 1898, married him in Toronto, where she was a member of the choir of Dr. Wyld's church. They left for England almost immediately after. His wife eventually associated herself with the surfrist movement and they found it expedient to separate. He went to the war, and at the conclusion of peace received a friendly letter from his wife expressing pleasure at his safe return.

No arrest has yet been made, Jewelry belonging to the murdered woman also was taken at the time of the crime. The above is one of many terrible crimes which have caused a sensation throughout England. This week the murderer of Miss Shore in a railway train near Lowest is still at large. The deceased was with the Canadian nurses at Etaples at the time of bombing of the hospital by enemy aeroplanes.
