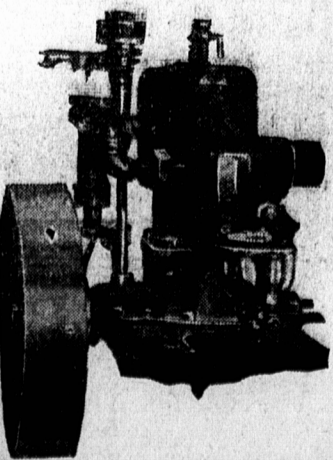

HINTS FOR THE AMATEUR NURSE

There are many cases of slight illness and indisposition in every family, when the service of a trained hospital nurse is not necessary, and the care and attention of those in the household are sufficient to bring the sick one back to health and strength in good season. Sometimes it is a child who is ill; sometimes a guest is confined to her room with a slight indisposition; or the mother of the house may be compelled to lie aside, upstairs, for a week or two or even only for a day, to recover from overstrained nerves or one of the headaches that mothers in busy, noisy homes are prone to fall heir to. Some women are born nurses; others detest being in a sick room, but experience of their own has given them a deft hand, a quiet foot and the knowledge of what to do and how to do it. Calmness, quietness and neatness are three essentials in the sick room. Haste should always be avoided. If you don't know what to do, on no account allow the patient to guess your dilemma. Do something with a composed and capable manner, and slip out of the room as soon as possible to phone the doctor about what should really be done. Remember, no matter how bright and brisk you feel yourself, the sufferer cannot bear a strong light. Keep the sick room darkened, with one window raised a little for air. See that the window shades are even, the table and bureau covers are straight and immaculately fresh. Above all, do not allow a heterogeneous mass of things to accumulate on the bedside bureau—nothing so tries the nerves of a sick woman who loves orderliness herself. Hang up all garments immediately after they are

discarded, and remember to keep a little table with a timepiece, a fresh handkerchief and a glass of cool water at the invalid's elbow.

Never go into the sick room looking tired, hot or dishevelled. Slip on a dainty apron, smooth your hair, and wear a serene countenance. Make sure that the tray you carry is as inviting as it can be made. An appetizing morsel of food, served piping hot or ice cold, and accompanied by a very little thin bread and butter, will tempt a capricious appetite when a tray laden down with a hearty meal will only arouse distaste. Meet the fretting of a querulous invalid with a smile. Look sympathetic, and don't say too much. Remember the uncommittal manner of the professional nurse. At the time you were ill, it may have seemed cold, but you look back to it as restful and grateful. Such a nurse is trusted more by the patient than one who seems to worry with her worries and who gives deep sympathy for sufferings rather than a calm and cheery belief in her speedy recovery.

Above all be quiet in the sick room. Do not slam doors, or bang window blinds. Do not use a carpet sweeper, and see to it that a quick movement does not jar the bed. Never whisper just outside the door to another person—the invalid is positive you are talking about her symptoms, and is aggrieved that she cannot hear what is said. And finally, never allow any invalid to feel neglected or alone. See that a little bell is on the table by the bedside, or provide some other means of calling, if assistance is required.
