(Continued from page 7.) and his colleagues who had so ably presented our case and won the great boon of a handsomely increased surplus. Coming to the Car Ferry, he hoped that it would prove a great boon, and if properly constructed and managed ought to solve the problem of transportation during ten months of the year. He was glad to note the promised aid to our road system. The country must have better roads. The importance of education could not be over-estimated. The teachers were not properly paid. The system had run down. We formerly had better teachers, and must pay our teachers more. He concluded by warmly commending the modern system of ballot-voting which the Government had promised to introduce.

MR. GALLANT in seconding the motion extolled the monarchical form of Government and our excellent Sovereigns past and present. King George had no more loyal and devoted subjects than those of French-Canadian race. Providence had given us good harvests, and the farmers had good prices. He was proud

its origin in Prince County and promised great results. To Hon. Mr. Dalton was due the credit of a pioneer in this matter which had already made the Province famous. The boon of having our oyster fisheries restored could not be over-estimated. The Car Ferry might be hoped to do great things for the Province. It would make P. E. Island an integral part of Canada in a sense that had never been, and would do away with the three short-haul grievances. In regard to the increased subsidy he said the late Government had been handicapped for want of funds and therefore could not keep house properly. Now we had better things before us and should keep house well and keep it clean. Better roads were indispensable and he hoped in two years to see a great improvement. He commended the promised ballot bill, which he said had been supported by the Conservatives in the late House.

MR. RICHARDS noted a new departure in not submitting the Speech to a committee of the whole House. He complimented the mover and seconder on their efforts. They would

In addition to the debating power of the House, if they held themselves free from undue partisanship. This they could afford as the Government had an embarrassment of riches in the way of support. He paid a compliment to Mr. Speaker and counted upon his impartiality which if maintained would receive support from himself and his colleague, the latter an old parliamentarian. He claimed that the country had been carried by lavish promises. Our roads were to be equal to those of old Roman roads which stood for ages. It was little wonder that the Liberal party went down to defeat, but it was at the end of a long and successful term of power. For himself he had no regret in being relegated to private life, but he did regret the loss of many of his able colleagues. He praised the fidelity of the district which he and his colleagues represented—the banner district of Liberalism. He congratulated the Premier of his success in public life after his able and arduous labors as leader of the Opposition. He also congratulated the Commissioner of Public Works.

Of course he had not not the experience of his predecessor, but he has a good knowledge of mechanics and would not doubt his best. As to the Commissioner of Agriculture it was unfortunate that he is not a practical farmer. The ministerial party is short of farmers and long on lawyers. Yet Mr. Richards believed the new Commissioner would do his best. The Governor's speech was a lengthy document, and contained some matters of importance. He had the honor to represent the Province at the coronation which was a most splendid and imposing ceremony. He doubted not that the Duke of Connaught would make an excellent Governor General and when he comes to visit this Province he will receive a loyal welcome. The farmers are prosperous, largely due to their own efforts and the wise provisions of the Liberal Government which had done about all that had been done for their behalf. As to fox farming, it is an important enterprise, and had to be guarded against too much speculation. He suggested a herd book to register pedigrees, and legislation to prevent misrepresentation in selling. He regretted the decrease of population, but the restless spirit of the young people and the lure of the west could not easily be controlled. He believed if they would stay they could do equally well at home. The delegation to Ottawa was important but not more so than some previous ones. The increased subsidy was not due to the delegation. They presented claims, perhaps very ably that had been presented before, along with a claim on account of Northwest boundaries and lands. As to that Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Fielding had stated in his hearing that this Province should receive consideration. He believed the new subsidy was given largely in consequence of what was being done for England. He elaborated this point, claiming that this matter was not presented by the recent delegation.

to the oyster question the Premier set forth the difficulties encountered by the delegation. All public harbors were reserved to the Dominion. The Government had not power to act. It required an act of Parliament, and the terms of that act were agreed upon and settled before the delegates left Ottawa. The leader of the Opposition made a statement that this matter was in the way of settlement under the late Government. That was not true. 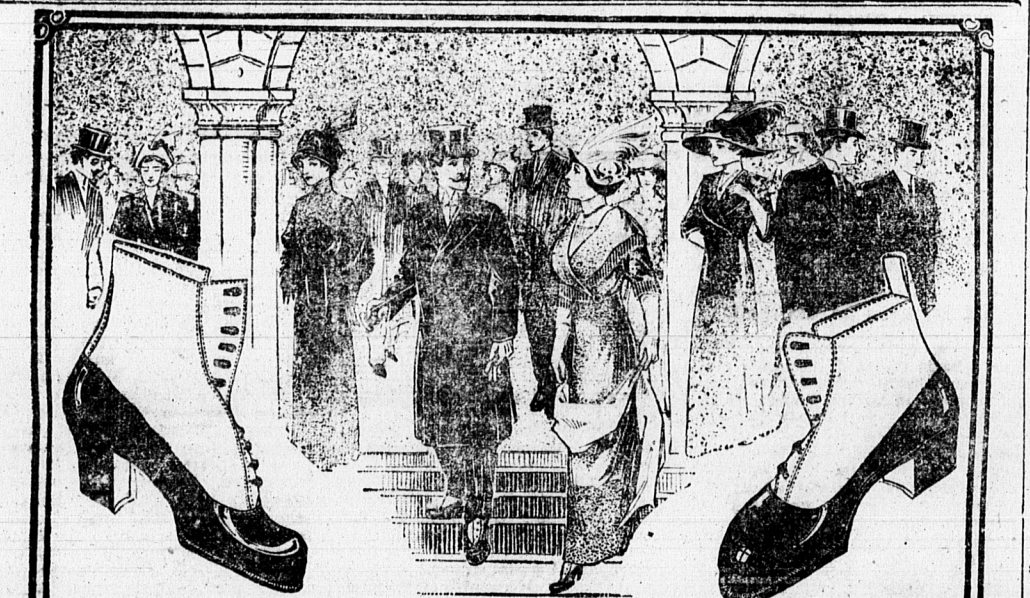
