Federal Survey Of Highway Plan Within Fortnight

Premier MacMillan's Recent Announcement In Legislature Corroborated By Prime Minister In Parliament.

Investigates Maziism

Representative John W. McCord of Boston, Mass., has been appointed chairman of a committee to investigate Nazi and other foreign activities which may be subversive of law and order in the United States.

OTTAWA, April 13—Prime Minister MacMillan will receive a proportionate share of government assistance with respect to his highway plan, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett declared in the House of Commons today. A. E. MacLean (Lib. Prince) said that his province had cost the country far less per capita for unemployment relief than any other, and that it should be given some assistance in the establishment of good roads.

The Prime Minister said an engineer would survey the situation within the next fortnight, and ascertain what assistance the government may usefully give in the building of highways on the island. Mr. MacLean also made a plea for lower rates on the car-ferry which he described as "an inter-provincial bridge" connecting Prince Edward Island with the mainland. In the old days automobiles had to be loaded on flat cars before going on the boat. Now they are driven on and off, and Mr. MacLean believed the saving thus effected should be reflected in the cost of passage.

UNARMED TRIBESMEN SLAUGHTERED

League of Nations Demands Explanation of Action From the Liberian Gov't.

OTTAWA, April 13—(By Canadian Press)—The plight of the Liberian fishing industry will be investigated by the Stevens committee, it was announced today in the House of Commons by Premier R. B. Bennett. And he pledged the Government to give favorable consideration to any scheme advanced by provincial authorities to place the industry on its feet.

The Stevens Committee, said the Prime Minister, will hear representations designed to increase prices and lower spread between produce and consumer.

Will Rebuild Iron And Steel Industry

LONDON, April 14—(Saturday)—(Canadian Press Cable)—The British Iron and Steel Federation today made public a draft five year plan through which it hopes to gain complete control of the industry throughout the empire.

The impression was created that the scheme has the approval of the treasury and that the present 1-3 percent duty on imported iron and steel will remain in force, instead of expiring next October as planned originally. The duty was imposed on condition that the industry reorganize itself.

INDEPENDENT SHIPPERS PASS RESOLUTION

Urge Interests of Smaller Potato And Turnip Shippers.

At a meeting attended by some six or eight independent potato shippers, held last evening in the office of Mr. MacMillan and presided over by Mr. J. L. Douglas, the following resolution was passed: "Whereas certain changes have developed in potato marketing during the past few years which have given increased control to three large shippers, and

"Whereas a control board is about to be formed in this Province to regulate the marketing of natural products, and

"Whereas three large shippers have had the opportunity of expressing their opinions to the Agricultural Committee of the Legislative Assembly while the smaller independent shippers have not had an equal opportunity,

"Be it therefore resolved that the Government of this Province be respectfully urged to carefully consider the interests of the smaller potato and turnip shippers and that a Committee of three be appointed from this meeting to wait upon the Agricultural Committee of the Legislative Assembly at its pleasure, to present a copy of this resolution and such arguments as may, in the opinion of the Committee be in the best interests of the industry at large.

"It was further resolved that J. L. Douglas, P. J. Noy and A. MacMillan be delegated as the committee to take care of the above resolution.

"It was further resolved that a Committee consisting of J. L. Douglas, P. J. Noy and Allan I. MacKay act as the committee for the formation of a non-profit, non-trading service organization for the interests of potato shippers."

SOVIET GOV'T. HONORS HEROES

Rescued and Rescuers of Wrangel Expedition Receive Recognition.

OTTAWA, April 13—The seven aviators who rescued 101 Russians from an Arctic sea ice floe and thereby wrote a brilliant chapter in the history of human struggles against far-northern elements were given the highest honor tonight over accorded by the Soviet Government.

By a special recommendation of Josef Stalin and other high officials a new and unprecedented title was created especially for them—that of "heroes of the Soviet Union." In addition, they and their mechanics were awarded the Order of Lenin and a monetary reward of one year's salary. The Order of Lenin is the most coveted medal within the power of the Soviet Government to grant.

TENSE SITUATION EXISTS IN FRANCE

French Premier Refuses To Yield On Policy of Salary And Pension Slashes.

PARIS, April 13—(Associated Press)—An exciting day marked by strikes, rumors, falling stock market prices and a fight on high seas was climaxed tonight by the first refusal of Premier Gaston Doumergue to yield on his policy of salary and pension slashes.

The Communists failed in their efforts to start a widespread strike of government employees in Paris and the provinces although various short protest demonstrations were staged, making the situation tense most of the day.

Bright Spots Of The Week

OTTAWA, April 13—The public works which will be initiated by the Dominion Government in connection with relief of unemployment will be "along the line of the suggestions that were made by the Construction Association and other industrial groups throughout the country during the last few months," Premier R. B. Bennett told the House of Commons today.

Later he stated that "the government proposes to introduce a bill dealing with works and schedule would be attached to it indicating what the proposed works were. He did not hold out any hope that there would be large appropriations covering small items. He intimated however something might be done along the lines suggested by Hon. J. L. Ralston (Lib. Yarmouth-Sheburne), that certain small wharves and other works of that nature be built.

Can. Chickens Find Favor In Britain

OTTAWA, April 13—(By Canadian Press)—The demand for Canadian frozen chickens from British buyers. The largest shipment in 20 years—4,000 boxes—is now en route to Great Britain. Announcement was made today by the Department of Agriculture.

The birds in this shipment were mostly assembled in Winnipeg and were packed according to government standards and government inspected. In addition, this particular shipment is of the weight most in demand in the Old Country.

Strikes Continue To Dot U. S. Industrial Horizon

NEW YORK, April 13—Strikes and rumors of strikes in oil and automotive fields weighed down one side of the industrial scale today while fattening pay envelopes in other industries were thrown on the counter balance.

Saloon and silver makers were recipients of cheering news. Ten percent wage increase were applied to the minimum scale for 13,000 sailors of Great Lakes carriers. Association and Induction pointed toward the arrival of the eight-hour day on the Lakes.

R. Wallace and Company, silverware makers at Wallingford, Conn., handed its 1,000 employees a 10 percent raise. Wage bonus of various sizes were announced at the Corning (N. Y.) glass works and the Ingersoll Rand plant at Painted Post.

Insull Extradited From Turkey, Long Flight Ends

Insull was formerly extradited from Turkey, April 13—Samuel Insull dropped his role of man without a country tonight and called for the United States, a prisoner at last of an American official.

The 74 year old head of the wrecked Insull Utilities was formally delivered to Burton Y. Berry of the United States Embassy, 15 months after he fled from fraud charges at home and two weeks after Turkish officials arrested him.

In an extremely brief and simple ceremony, the Turkish police commissioner Nali Bey handed the white-haired former multi-millionaire over to Berry, who gave the port.

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
