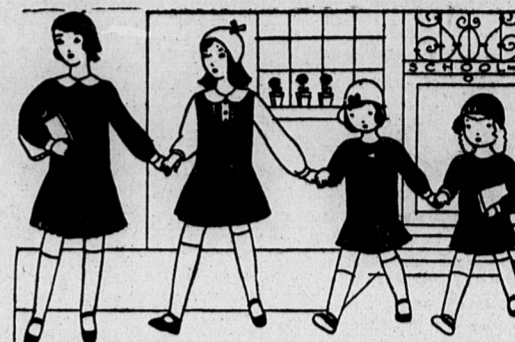

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—Foreign women and children were fleeing from Changsha, Hunan province capital, for Hankow, yesterday because of the increasing menace of 5,000 Communists approaching the city with the evident intention of attempting to recapture it.

With no protection except a weak-

ened garrison of provincial troops of doubtful loyalty at Changshai, it was felt to be imperative to evacuate as many foreigners as possible to avoid the possibility of an attack such as hordes of Communists recently made on the city, when foreign property was looted and burned.

MRS. BARBARA S. MONTGOMERY

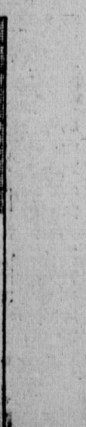
