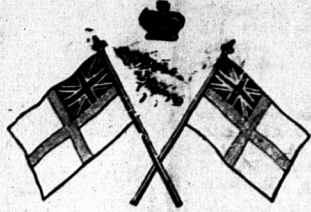

—TRIBUTE TO CANADA.

LONDON, July 4—Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain, presiding at a luncheon in honor of Hon. Geo. E. Foster, at the Constitutional club this afternoon, paid a fine tribute to the oldest and most progressive of the dominions.

"It is to Canada, under its late government," he said, "that we owe the first step towards a system of imperial preference. To the already good fortune of Mr. Foster in linking Canada with the West Indies by a trade agreement, he is now engaged in an effort to link up the dominions among themselves by a system of imperial preference. We blush to think that for the moment you, Mr. Foster, are precluded from the hope that the motherland itself should take part in such a commercial union, but for the moment only. (Loud cheers.)

"Before long, however, we will have a different government. Each by-election brings the day nearer, and before long there will be a government that will grasp the hand you have extended to us, whose first task and whose proudest duty it will be to cooperate with you in creating these bonds of commercial union, which will foster and cement the strength of the empire.

"Canada is a great imperial sanatorium. It offers us, if we want them, employment for skilled workmen and a field for investment fully reproductive. Imperialism is the sentiment which has a practical application, and I believe that the practical application must be given if the best is to be made of this empire and all its parts.

"I am still a preferentialist. (Applause.) To bind the people of an empire together I know of no other way so effective as the interchange of sentiments and products. Even now when the idea of preferentialism has not been taken up by all parts of the empire, good work is going on underneath, because the commerce between the different parts is continually increasing, and as it increases so will they be brought more closely together." (Loud Cheers.)

FINGER PRINT IDENTIFICATION

BRANTFORD, July 4—The superiority of the finger print identification over Bertillon system was the subject of an address by Inspector Foster, of Ottawa, at the session of the Dominion police chiefs here last night. A spirited discussion was launched on the subject of confessions by Superintendent Rogers of the provincial police. The chiefs were not unanimous that an officer was privileged to lie to a prisoner in order to secure information; a recent case at Saint Boniface was held as one in point.

ALBANIAN REVOLT.

NEW YORK, July 4—A Rome cable says: Close attention is now being paid by the Italian government to the course of events in Albania. The revolt there may easily spread into Macedonia, and make Italian intervention unavoidable.

The Italy has absolutely no designs upon territory in the Balkan peninsula, she is, more than any other power, anxious to see the status quo maintained. Signor Bissolati, leader of the right wing of the Socialist party, favors intervention in Italy in the Albanian agitation in order to embarrass Turkey still further. In the message, he is urging this line of policy upon the Italian government.

There is, however, not much likelihood that the cabinet will follow such counsel. Italy has no hand in the unrest, and would do everything possible to appease it. In fact, it is positively stated that although the Albania revolt might prove instrumental in enforcing the porte to move for peace, the Italian government desires sincerely to see the revolt ended. This detail is only another peculiarity of the Turko-Italian conflict, which is now less a war than a diplomatic tournament.

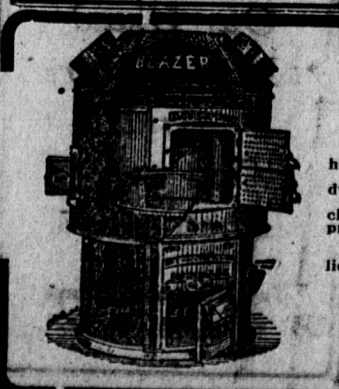
