EXEMPT FROM CIVIC TAXES (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, April 1. - Property of the Halifax Harbor Commissioners is exempt from civic business tax, the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia ruled Saturday. The finding was made in answers to five questions submitted before the Court jointly by the Harbor Commissioners and the city of Halifax after the city had assessed the commission property at \$500,000 for business tax purposes. City Solicitor C. P. Bethune announced after the court's decision had been handed down that the city would carry an appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada.
