IN MEMORIAM.

William C. Lea.

At his home in Tryon, in the early hours of the first day of March, 1911, William C. Lea passed peacefully and quietly to his eternal rest. He was

born in Lower Tryon, March 22nd, 1833, a son of the late John Lea and grandson of Richard Lea, who came to P. E. Island in 1825, from Burgh, Lincolnshire, England. As a young man and throughout his life (which included some of the most stirring periods in the political history of the

Island) he took a deep and active interest in all matters relative to the welfare of his country. Always a Liberal and strong supporter of his party, he took a prominent part in the discussion of the questions of those days immediately preceding the consummation of Confederation—days of intense import, when political feeling was at its height—and which marked a new era in the history of the inhabitants of P. E. Island. In 1872, Mr. Lea was elected to represent the First District of Queen's County in the Legislative Assembly. In 1876, as a supporter of free schools, he was again elected to represent the Fourth District of Prince County.

As a magistrate, representative and public-spirited citizen generally, his influence was at all times exerted in behalf of every measure, tending to promote the best interests of the people and community in which he lived.

A farmer himself, he did his utmost to forward all progressive systems and methods of an agricultural nature, was one of the organizers of the Farmers' Insurance Co., and for many years carried on a considerable business, buying and shipping farm produce.

Through these political and business connections, Mr. Lea had a wide circle of acquaintances, particularly in the central portion of the Island and in Cape Breton, and by his unflinching integrity, broad sympathies, kindly and courteous disposition, made large numbers of friends wherever he was known. In his own and surrounding districts, he was individually and universally loved and respected. In his private life, he was a devoted member of the Methodist Church, a most considerate, tenderly loving husband and father, a warm and faithful friend, and his death at the close of a long and full life, is most sincerely felt by all.

Mr. Lea is survived by a widow and seven children. The daughters are: Mrs. E. Boswell of Victoria and Mrs. J. T. Windsor of Craupud, P. E. I. The sons: C. H. Lea of California, John B. R. of Victoria, P. E. I.; R. S. and W. S. Lea of Montreal and Walter on the homestead.

Many tributes to the memory of one who holds such a deep and abiding place in their hearts will be extended to the bereaved and mourning family.

PROGRAMME FOR CORONATION FESTIVITIES

LONDON, March 10.—The arrangements for the festivities to be held in connection with the coronation are now so far advanced that it is possible to give a fairly complete programme of the main events, some of which have already received the approval of the King, and some still provisional. The actual coronation festivities will begin on June 19th and end on the last day of that month, when the court will go to Windsor.

June 17, 18 and 19 the royal representatives will arrive in London. June 19—The royal representatives will probably be entertained at dinner at Buckingham Palace by the King and Queen, after which their majesties will hold a reception of the various suites.

June 20—The special envoys and delegations will be received by their majesties at Buckingham Palace, and the state banquet will be held in the evening.

June 21—The colonial premiers and other representatives will be received by their majesties during the day and some member of the royal family, possibly the Duke of Connaught, will entertain the colonial guests at dinner.

June 22—The coronation.

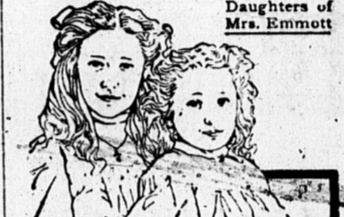
June 23—The royal procession through South London.

June 24—Their majesties will travel to Spithead and there embark on the royal yacht and hold a naval review. The princess and envoys will return to town on the same day, but the King and Queen may decide to remain on board for the week end.

June 25—A gala performance will take place at the theatre.

June 26—A gala performance will attend a special service in St. Paul's Cathedral and will afterwards lunch in state at the Guildhall.

Lord Kitchener has been appointed to command the 56,000 troops to be assembled in London on coronation day in the ensuing week.

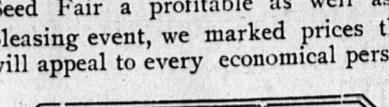

WASHINGTON HAS STRIPPED MASK FROM WAR GAME

WASHINGTON, March 10.—That the Administration has decided to discontinue no longer in its reasons for the sudden and unprecedented movement of troops to the Mexican border is indicated by the following despatch received last night from the staff correspondent of the Associated Press, who is accompanying President Taft on his journey to Atlanta. The despatch, dated Charlottesville, Va., through which place the President's train passed tonight at 7:30 o'clock, is as follows:

All doubt as to the purpose of the Government in sending 20,000 troops to the Mexican border has at last been swept away. The United States has determined that the revolution in the Republic to the south must end. The American troops have been sent to form a solid military wall along the Rio Grande to stop filibustering and to see that there is no further smuggling of arms and men across the international boundary. It is believed that with this course of contraband supplies cut off the insurrectionary movement which has disturbed conditions generally for nearly a year without accomplishing anything like the formation of a responsible independent Government will speedily come to a close.

The scene of activity in connection with the movement of troops has shifted now to the long line which they will occupy and official Washington has become merely a place for the receipt of reports showing the progress of the units toward their places of rendezvous.

Before leaving for Atlanta yesterday afternoon President Taft had a protracted conference with Senor De La Barra, the Mexican Ambassador, and assured him, as in a telegram he assured President Diaz at Mexico City that the Mexican Government and people need have no concern as to the intentions of the United States in the military demonstration, no matter what gossip there might be to the contrary. The Ambassador declared himself more than satisfied with the President's assurances. It was learned from official sources that there had been more or less discussion between the State Department and representatives of several European nations as to the internal conditions in Mexico. But it was said that this discussion had no time taken on the proportions of what the diplomats call "representations."

The War Department last night made public the text of the telegram which was sent today to the Adjutant-General of the several states, inviting a "limited number" of militia officers to avail themselves of the opportunity afforded by these manoeuvres for observation and technical study. The pay and transportation of such officers will be defrayed from the special appropriation for joint manoeuvres. The extensiveness of the medical accompaniments to the army and navy in the movement southward adds to the significance of the operations.

Extensive preparations are being made by Surgeon General Torney of the Army, to take care from a medical standpoint for any length of time of the 20,000 soldiers which are being rushed to the frontier. A "Reserve Medical Supply" which contains medical supplies for 2,000 troops for three months will be shipped from St. Louis to San Antonio tomorrow. Two base hospitals which are the largest used by any army in the field are being assembled at St. Louis from which point they can be dispatched southward on telegraphic notice.

In addition to four field hospitals and four ambulance companies, the Surgeon General is rushing to "the front" at San Antonio 14 residential hospitals and two evacuation hospitals. Adequate medical hospital facilities also are being made for the troops which will be stationed at San Diego, Cal., and Galveston, Tex.

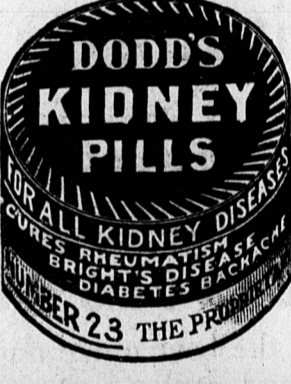
