Plot Revealed to Blow up Embassy Residences

TOKIO, Oct. 15.—A plot was confessed in court here today to blow up certain embassy residences, thus involving Japan with foreign powers and affording an opportunity to Communists and radicals to revolt against the government during the confusion.

The confession was made by a Korean named Kinchokan, arrested some time ago as having connection with Bokuretsu, the Korean radical who, with his wife, Fumiko was sentenced to life imprisonment for plotting to kill the Japanese Imperial family. Fumiko a pretty Japanese killed herself in her cell.

Kinchokan's confession was made unexpectedly. The public was promptly dismissed from the courtroom and the trial ordered continued in the Judges chambers.

A Pretty Movie Face

"To be a beauty, a girl must have the color of personality, of individuality. Particularly is this true in the case of screen actresses."

Will Investigate Dr. Wyllie's Charges

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The Ottawa collegiate institute board will hold a special meeting this evening to decide what course to follow in connection with the references made by Rev. Dr. Wyllie before the Presbyterian Synod of Montreal and Ottawa as to student dances.

The Principal of the college will also summon Dr. Wyllie's son, Gordon, a collegiate student, who, in an interview yesterday, spoke of older boys of the school drinking from pocket flasks in the basement. Gordon Wyllie will also be asked what he knows about the reports of so-called "petting parties" to which he referred in the interview.

British Women's Plans

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The annual meeting of the National Council of Women of Great Britain, to be held at Westminster October 19 to 22, has a full program for discussion, including slums, licensing reform, women under English law, the work of married women, maternal mortality and electricity in the home. There will be one special meeting for girls.

Resolutions to be submitted include, calling on the government to pass into law a measure enfranchising women at the same age and on the same terms as men, and another for establishing equal rates of payment to men and women in the Civil Service and in school teaching for similar work.

They Prefer Long Hair

LONDON, Oct. 15.—Lady Mary Lygon has not bobbed her hair for the reason that she likes long hair best. "I think long hair is prettier and believe it is more comfortable," said the popular society leader.

Lady Alexandra Haig, daughter of Earl Haig; Lady Hope, daughter of the Countess of Seafield, and many other young leaders in society also have refused to have their hair bobbed.

Yardmaster Killed

YARMOUTH, N. S., Oct. 15.—Yardmaster Ralph K. Cleveland was killed in the railway yards here yesterday morning when he was thrown under the wheels of a tender of a shunting locomotive and decapitated. The accident was precipitated, it is believed by the locomotive becoming engaged with a motor car parked too near the tracks. Cleveland jumped on the running board in the car in an endeavor to free the obstruction and was hurled to his death.

She is loaded with bulk salt for Loggie Bros. Schr. Conductor, Capt. F. Murray is discharging a load of Little Bras D'Or coal at the ferry wharf for the Georgetown Ferry Co. She cleared for Pictou for a load of coal for A. A. McDonald. Schr. Leo, Capt. Horace Hyde, is discharging a load of coal at the railway wharf for C. N. R. This completes Capt. Hyde's contract for carrying coal for this port. He also carried five hundred tons for the C. N. R. at Murray Harbor and twelve hundred tons for this port. Richards, is in the stream awaiting a favorable chance to sail for Pictou for a load of coal.

—MISSION CLOSURES.—The renewal of the Mission which was being held throughout the week in St. Paul's Church, Summerside concluded on Sunday night when there was an exceptionally large attendance. In the evening the final service was held, Rev. Father MacDonald preaching the sermon on "Baptism." The members of the congregation then renewed their baptismal vows after which they received the indulgences and the Papal Blessing. Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament brought this very successful Mission to a close.

—HOME-BREW CASES.—Saturday was field day in Summerside for alleged distillers of Island home brew and several cases came before Mr. Alexander Campbell, J. P., and Mr. J. L. Palmer, J. P. A man from Tignish for brewing beer was convicted and fined \$60 and costs or two months in jail. In giving judgment the Magistrate remarked that this was the smallest penalty that could be imposed and said that the maximum would be \$200. As this was the defendant's first appearance he was given the minimum. A man from McNeill's Mills for having in his possession a quantity of "mash" which with all apparatus had been seized by the officers was fined \$200 and costs or six months. The Magistrate stated that in this case he was empowered by the act to impose a penalty of \$500 or twelve months in jail but in view of the circumstances imposed only the minimum. A man from Greenmount for brewing beer without a license was convicted and fined \$50 and costs or two months in jail. A case against a man from Richmond on whose premises a "still" was found was dismissed for lack of sufficient evidence. Another case was adjourned for a week upon request of counsel.
