DOMINION EXPERIMENTAL FARM

Mr. K. Stewart is in charge of the large exhibit which deals with plant diseases and modern farm methods. On one side is shown a model beehive and stave silo, samples of ensilage feed and an early maturing purple corn which could easily be adapted to Island soil. In conjunction with these are illustrations showing steps in bee-keeping, methods of fertilizing soil and of correcting soil acidity. The opposite side is devoted to entomology and the prevention of insect plagues and contains a very complete collection of all kinds of insects in all stages of life.

HEALTH CENTRE

A large section of the building is occupied by the Health Centre and child welfare booth in charge of Miss Mona Wilson, District Health Nurse and Miss Mill. The feature of this year is school hygiene and shown at the booth are sanitary drinking fountains which do away with the old fashioned drinking mug in rural schools, an inexpensive washstand for use in similar institutions and a single seat adjustable school desk the low cost of which adapts it to country school use. Other items in the same category are translucent window shades that shut out the glare of sunlight, the best type of blackboard, inside caustic lavatories and everything else that go to make up a healthful school house. One of the cleverest and most original ideas of the exhibition are in this booth, viz. the House of Good Health and the "Witches House". The first is composed of fruit, vegetables, oatmeal, whole wheat bread, milk and all that goes with a healthful diet, while the latter is constructed with pastry, candy, cake, coffee, tea, and everything that a child should not eat. Handwork of the Junior Red Cross in other provinces and original health posters by the Island juniors are prominently placed and worthy of notice. Those in charge of the booth are kept busy weighing and measuring children to whom this exhibit is the most attractive of all.

Near the entrance is a very attractive exhibit featuring "Muresoco" the perfect wall finish, that is easy to apply and will neither rub, crack nor peel. An electrically operated delinroscope illustrates the various steps in handling the mail in post offices.
