EASTERN NOTES.—Spring is here, considerably earlier than the average, and the farmers are bestirring themselves accordingly.—The opinion of your correspondent that there wasn't the usual quantity of ice in the Gulf this winter, has been verified by the weather. True, at the time of writing a large body has come down the north shore from the

westward which may yet affect the winds and the temperature, but the south side is as clear as mid summer. While other winters we were for days and sometimes weeks with the ice blocked in solid to Cape Breton, so that we might go over and shake hands with the stalwart Judiquer, or exchange greetings with the Gaelic son of Mabou, this winter, there was only a small body, and that drifting from one shore to the other.—Some of the fishermen have out their net moorings, but there is no herring so far.
