## INCREASES IN SUPPLEMENTS

Was Characteristic Feature of Meetings

Held in the Different School Districts of the Province—More Money Voted was for Improvements, Etc.

**ALBERTON.**  
 The meeting was very satisfactory in every respect. The receipts were \$535 and the expenditure \$489. The supplements were increased from \$190 to \$250. The fourth room was ordered to be re-opened. The total appropriation for next year is \$444.

**SOURIS.**  
 The annual School meeting took place in the School room, Souris. James McQuaid was appointed Chairman and A. L. Fraser Trustee in place of Dr. McLellan whose term expired. There was voted for the ensuing year the sum of \$500.00, of this amount \$200.00 for supplement to the teachers, one half to be paid to the principal, George B. McEachern was appointed auditor. On motion the Domestic Animals Act was put in force in the School District for the ensuing year. Frank Mossey, Michael Cheverie, D. Hearty and Edmund Lavie were appointed Reeves.

**MAYFIELD.**  
 The annual meeting was held in Mayfield School on Tuesday, with W. G. Houston in the chair. About the usual number of ratepayers were present. The following are the trustees for the ensuing year:—Silas Wyand, Nelson Orr and J. E. Fraser. The sum of \$52.50 was voted for expenses, \$20 of which is to be used as supplement to teacher. The ratepayers have secured the services of Miss Martha Brown as teacher for another year, this making her sixth year of continuous teaching in Mayfield. Congratulations are due the ratepayers on their valuable choice, and all bespeak many years of success in store for Miss Brown.

**POWELL.**  
 The annual school meeting was held on the 21st inst. Joan Smith was appointed Chairman. W. Watson the retiring trustee was succeeded by Albert Jenkins.

The Board now consists of James B. Jones, James Praught and Albert Jenkins. A. A. Moore was re-elected Secretary. Owing to a large surplus it was only necessary to vote the sum of \$58.50 to cover all expenses. It is the intention of the trustees to beautify the school surroundings. The trustees report highly eulogised Miss Spurr, also Miss Ada Campbell, who succeeded her. At the afternoon meeting the following resolution, which has been in force for years, was again made law, viz: "That all domestic animals be not allowed to run at large in the district for the ensuing year." Caution. This law is to be strictly enforced without fear, favor, or partiality. The meeting as usual was pleasant, all looking forward to the building of the Consolidated School near Powell.

**KINGSTON.**  
 The annual school meeting passed off quietly and was conducted in a business like way, that was highly creditable to the rate payers. George Crawley retired as trustee and was unanimously re-elected, he will also act as Secretary, as hitherto. Midsummer holidays were sustained. Last summer the school house was moved to a drier site further from the highway, and thoroughly repaired. Larger grounds were also purchased. The expense in connection with these improvements being heavy, was not all assessed last year, a balance of \$80 being carried over, which was voted at the meeting this year. **CAPE TRAVERSE.**  
 The annual meeting of the School District No. 82, Cape Traverse was held on Tuesday. The following votes were made:—supplement \$75 for both rooms, running expenses and repairs \$132. Total \$207.

**STANLEY BRIDGE.**  
 The meeting was harmonious throughout. The trustees are A. J. McLeod, R. Brown and James Reid, re-elected, in place of John McGoogan, retired. No supplement was voted for principal, \$25 for assistant, \$65 for janitor and \$10 for repairs. No teachers have yet been engaged.

**ELM-DALE.**  
 The following votes were made at the school meeting. Supplement \$20. Fuel and contingent expenses \$10. School house \$12. Total \$52. The secretary of the trustees is J. C. Bearfoot.

**BELLSVILLE.**  
 An excellent annual meeting was held. For the past two years the school has been repaired and is now in excellent condition. \$162 was voted which includes an increase of \$5 in teacher's supplement. The map, presented by A. A. Lefugey M. P. was fittingly acknowledged. The present teacher Miss Mamie McLeod has resigned.

**SPRINGFIELD.**  
 The annual meeting of Springfield School No. 95, was held in the schoolhouse, Ronald McDonald acting Chairman. On Ronald McDonald retiring Michael Lamb was appointed trustee. A Ferguson was auditor and examined the books. Miss Eva B. Reagh tendered her resignation as teacher. On motion \$35 was voted for supplement and \$5 for running expenses. The new map of Prince Edward Island was presented to the meeting, and some were not very well pleased in the way those maps were forced into the schools. Just one year ago the district was at the expense of buying a map of the Maritime Provinces.

**CAVENDISH.**  
 The annual meeting of the Cavendish school district was held on Tuesday the 21st. Charles Simpson was appointed Chairman. The supplement voted for the teacher was \$25.00; for all other purposes \$80.00. All the rate-payers were in favor of a higher supplement if the present teacher, Miss Dockendorf, had remained with us. Trustees for the present year are:—Murray Robertson, Hammond McKenzie, William Graham.

**FREDERICTON.**  
 The annual school meeting of Fredericton was held Tuesday. The present board are James M. Stevenson W. M. Morrison, Howard Weeks. The district is so well pleased with their present teacher, N. S. J. Murray that they have voted him a liberal supplement. The amount voted for contingent expenses made a total of \$55.00.

**LOWER MONTAGUE.**  
 At the annual meeting the following sums were voted by the ratepayers: Supplement \$75, current expenses \$60, grading school ground \$20. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the principal, Mr. Le Lucheur for the interest he has taken in the Lower Montague school.—B. Aitken, Secretary Trustee.

**MARGATE.**  
 The annual meeting of the Margate school was held on Tuesday last. Only a small number of the ratepayers were present. A supplement of \$50 was voted, \$25 to the principal and \$25 to the primary department. The school has progressed favorably under the principal, Miss Mabel Brown and her assistant Miss Ramsay. Owing to Miss Ramsay sending in her resignation a new teacher will be required for the primary department for the coming year.—Mr. Glyden, Secretary.

**PORT HILL.**  
 The annual meeting of the rate-payers of the Port Hill School District, No. 4, Prince County was held on Tuesday the 21st inst at the usual hour. William Montgomery was appointed Chairman and Secretary of Trustees as Secy. Andrew Gillis retired as Trustee and on motion of the ratepayers was voted a supplement to the teacher's salary. It was moved by Archibald Montgomery seconded by Andrew Gillis that the thanks of the rate-payers of the Port Hill School District be tendered through the Secretary of this meeting to A. A. Lefugey M. P. for the splendid map of the Dominion of Canada on one site and of the world on the other showing all the British possessions. Motion carried unanimously. The District is very anxious to secure the services of one very popular teacher, John B. Brown for another year.
