Boys Have an Easier Time Than Girls When They Get the Marrying Complex, But They Need to be Careful About the Wives They Select

Dear Miss Dix—We are a group of boys who want to marry. Please tell us how to get wives. BILLY, DUDLEY, CHESTER, LAURENCE, DICK AND OTHERS. Answer: That's an easy question to answer. All that any fairly personable youth has to do to get married is just to stand around and look willing. Some girl will snap him up and rush him to the altar before he has time to change his mind. Getting married is just about the easiest thing a man can do. Keeping single is the hard trick.

I get thousands of letters from girls wanting to know how they can get husbands, but it is not once in a blue moon that a man asks how he can get a wife. Why this is I do not know. Maybe it is because women are more marry-minded than men. Maybe it is because girls aren't so choosy as boys are. Maybe it is because a man can go out and hunt up the kind of a wife he wants, whereas a girl has to sit on the sidelines, suck her thumb and wait for some man to notice her.

Witches On Broomsticks Ride Roughshod Tonight

THE GOBBLE-UNS' GITS YOU IF YOU DON'T WATCH OUT! All Hallow's Eve—do you recognize it?—yes, it is the ancient name for our modern Hallowe'en. The evening preceding All Saints' Day has been a festival among English-speaking people since time immemorial, tradition having it that on this night the spirits of the saints were abroad among the people where once they had lived in holiness, the sainted ones driving the spirits of the damned and the devils in forms of possessed animals, witches and similar evil beings, who would work harm to honest folk. In our present apartment-dwelling, electric-lighted, stream-lined day, we make merry by donning false-faces, putting candles in hollowed-out pumpkins, and pinning paper effigies of witches and black cats around the room, as conventional details of a merry party where high jinks are in order and dignity is taboo. The children of the neighborhood are abroad in costume, the constable or the police are content if no property damage occurs more heinous than soaping windows, and like many another surviving symbol of an ancient day, few there are who remember what it is all about except that it is a good thing to keep alive and observe annually. Whether one solemnly remembers and observes the religious significance of the occasion, or merely falls into the general, innocent spirit of gaiety of the evening, it is equally an occasion for rejoicing because Hallowe'en is essentially a happy occasion. In our present day, a congenial method of observing the evening is followed in hundreds of thousands of homes, friends being invited in, games being played, and refreshments being served.

Fun For Hallowe'en

(By Lucille Dunbar) For a jolly Hallowe'en party send out invitations, on yellow art paper cut in pumpkin shapes, and folded double. On the inside write the following verse: "On Hallowe'en—now listen well, For here's a secret, we will tell: A party were giving and you must be one To come early, stay late and enjoy the fun. Decorate the house like a pumpkin patch, with shocks of corn standing in each corner, strings of ears of corn hanging from the tops of windows, and pumpkins in suitable places. Have black cats, owls, bats, witches, and pumpkin ghosts cut from colored paper peering down on the scene from all available corners, draperies, etc., Jack-o-lanterns are of course a necessity, so have plenty of their grinning faces. A dim light gives mystery, so shade the lights. Where electric lights are used, put a pumpkin blossom shade made of orange crepe paper, on each bulb, or a flaming tissue paper poppy. Cut a big jack-o-lantern from a pumpkin, put a candle inside, and set in the center of the table. If the hostess and guests appear in costume suitable to Hallowe'en there is no end to the variety of costumes which may be made by skiffing fingers, and we have seen some very clever ones. When the guests arrive they are each handed a slip of paper, bearing half of a word which has some connection with Hallowe'en, such as witch, broom-stick, fortune, magic, pumpkin, etc. One half of the words are given to the girls, and the other half to the men, those whose slips match are partners for the first item on the program. This is a jolly pie eating contest, which breaks up all stiffness, and puts the guests at their ease. For this stunt carried out at a Hallowe'en party, the boys were lined up on one side of the room, and the girls on the other, partners being exactly opposite each other. The girls were given flat plates, on which were small individual pumpkin pies and spoons. At a given signal, the girls raced across the room, and began feeding the pie to their partners. The couple that finished first were pronounced winners. One of the conditions was that after the last bite the young men should have their mouths so nearly empty that they could whistle. To intensify the excitement, the plates were lightly buttered before the pies were put on them, making it more difficult for the girls to cut them with a spoon. Only the men competed in this race which followed the stunt, although the girls were divided into teams and cheered for the boys. The teams of five boys each were lined up back of a tape stretched tightly across the room. The captain of each team was given a large pumpkin. The men leaned forward with their hands on their knees. At a word "go," the captain passed the pumpkin between his legs to the next man in the line, and so on till the last man had grasped it, he then rushed forward to the head of his line, where he passed it back as before. The line automatically moved back each time to allow room at its head for the last man, if a pumpkin touched the floor, it had to be returned to the head of the line and started over again. The team whose captain was first to take his place at the head again won the race.
