42 COMPLETE AGRICULTURE SHORT COURSE

A very successful short course in agriculture, conducted during the past two weeks at St. Dunstan's College, closed yesterday afternoon. At a general meeting held in the morning inspirational addresses were given by the Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture; His Excellency, Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan, and Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. The Rector, Dr. J. A. Murphy, who presided at this meeting, thanked all those who contributed to the success of the course, especially the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, to the members of which departments the success of the course is in a great measure due. Dr. J. T. Crogan and other members of the faculty were also present.

Speaking for the students, Messrs. Henry Peters, Thomas Kieckham, Alban Gallant, Brendan Curran and Peter Conway said that they were thoroughly satisfied with the course and deeply appreciative of the efforts that had been made to make it practical and interesting. A vote of thanks to the College, to the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture and to all others who contributed to the course was moved by Mr. Lewis Campbell and seconded by Mr. James Lannon.

Forty two young men took this course. They were keenly interested throughout, followed faithfully the lectures and demonstrations, and expressed many times their satisfaction with the course and with the manner of the presentation of the subject matter by the lecturers and demonstrators.

The latter, in turn, were delighted with the responsive attitude of the students.
